PREFACE.

"THERE are two entire classes of public records, both highly important, which I am conscious have been but imperfectly used—I mean the Inquisitions Post Mortem and the early Wills.—Of the early Wills we do not possess even a printed catalogue of the names of Testators, much more any work which should communicate to the public the choicer portions of the information, topographical, historical, biographical, literary, which is lurking, unseen by every eye, in the dispersed, the dark and dusty depositories of the testamentary evidence of England. I am persuaded, by experience in such enquiries, that there is no department of antiquarian research, topography, public or literary history, lives of our eminent men in every department, manners, language, which would not be essentially benefited by a publication of matter, which to an experienced eye would appear of importance, in Wills of the Plantagenet, Tudor, and Stuart reigns, while a better acquaintance with these evidences would be the creation of a new world in our gentilitial Antiquities."

The preceding remarks, made by the Rev. Joseph Hunter, in the Preface to the second Volume of his History of the Deanery of Doncaster, induced the Council of the Surtees Society to turn their attention to such early Wills and Inventories as are preserved in the

Registry of the Diocese of Durham, illustrative of the public and private history, language, statistics, &c. &c., of the Northern Counties of England; and the present volume is the result of their investigation. In the earlier part of the volume, many new and valuable documents are brought to light, from which the public or local historian may derive the most novel and correct information. That these are not more numerous is owing to frequent chasms in the Registry, occasioned by time or neglect. Those early Wills and Inventories, however, which have presented themselves, and which are now (thanks to public spirit and the press) secure against the attacks of time or accident,* are of sufficient importance to throw great light upon their respective periods, and to excite the Members of the Society to investigate more minutely and effectually this most copious, and hitherto almost entirely unexplored, source of correct public or private informa-The early Registers of the Archbishops of York abound with documents of this nature, of the particulars of which almost nothing whatever is known, save the appointed burial place of each individual Testator. To ascertain this trifling fact, Torr, the Historian of York, and the Compiler of much valuable information relative to the Diocese and Province at large, still in MS., seems to have examined them, one after another, with great care, closing his eyes, however, to the clear light which they

could throw upon the men and manners of the four first centuries after the Conquest. The time, it may be hoped, is not far distant, when they will be examined again, and with greater anxiety, not to ascertain the hurial place of an individual, but as being themselves the burial place of much of the history, general and personal—and in this may be included every other kind of correct information relative to times and things—of all classes of men, over the widely-extending Province of York.

Soon after the year 1500, the Durham Series of Wills begins to be almost entirely perfect; and from that period downwards, as there has been no lack of matter for selection, so the utmost care has been taken to make such a selection as might best carry into effect the objects of the Society. Men of all classes, who have been forgotten for centuries, again appear, and afford the most minute and authentic information, not only relative to themselves and the rank in society which they occupied in their day, but numerous other incidental, and therefore the more valuable, notices and materials for an accurate history of the language and manners of our ancestors.

A few Wills, &c. have been obtained from other sources than the Durham Registry, and a few, which have been already before the public in substance, are reprinted, either at length, when such was not the case before, or are now, for the first time, given accurately, and with a due regard to that most important point, the phrase-ology of their respective periods, which had been previously either occasionally unattended to, or totally disregarded. Under the former class may be enumerated

It has been above remarked, that this source of information has been hitherto almost entirely unexplored. County historians have occasionally availed themselves of the wills of our ancestors, but it has been chiefly for the purpose of ascertaining descent of pedigree and estate. Mr. Surtees has, in his History of Durham, gone a step further than this. He has frequently used these documents in illustration of the rise and fall of families of importance connected with the county of Durham.— Again, in the year 1826, two volumes of Wills, illustrating manners, customs, descent of blood and property, &c., from the reign of Henry II. to the accession of ELIZABETH, were collected by Sir Nicholas Harris Nicolas, chiefly from printed authorities, and enriched by much valuable preliminary observation, and many useful explanatory and genealogical notes: but the document is rarely given to the public in its original language or phraseology; the Latin Wills are translated; the early English Wills are frequently printed in a modern garb; the accompanying Inventories are seldom if ever noticed; and neither their Editor nor Mr. Surtees, nor any other county historian, has even attempted to make the Wills and Inventories of the middle and lower ranks contribute their share of information to the general stock of historical and social knowledge.

The Council of the Surtees Society have been careful

to keep all these matters in view. They have attended to every minute characteristic of time and rank, of language and statistics, of religious feeling and domestic economy; and if they have only brought the present volume down to the year 1580, it is because the matter to which they have access, intervening between that year and the period of the Restoration, is of such great importance, as, in their opinion, to demand a volume even of a larger size than the present. On this subject the Council refer to the Report for the present year; and, in the mean time, they announce that communications from Members of the Society, or others, illustrative of the history, public or private, of the philology, statistics, &c. &c., of the present volume, will be gladly received by the Secretary.

William de Karilepho, Abbot of St. Vincent's, in Normandy—consecrated Bishop of Durham at Gloucester, 3rd Jan., 1082—Lord Chief Justice of England—the founder of the present cathedral church of Durham—died at Windsor, 6th Jan., 1095—buried in the Chapter House at Durham.

The above and the succeeding notices of the splendid robes, plate, &c., which the Monks of Durham obtained upon the death of each of its early Bishops, are, strictly speaking, neither Wills nor Inventories, but Mortuaries. They come, however, fully within our plan, and throw great light upon the clerical dress, church furniture, &c., &c., of their respective periods.

⁴ Nicholas de Farnham, Physician to the Queen, Bishop of Durham from 1241 to 1249. In the latter year he resigned his See, and dying at Stockton in 1257, was buried in the Chapter House of Durham Cathedral.

His heart was brought to Durham, and buried in the Chapter House. A very minute account of the travelling expenses of this prelate, at every resting place in his journey to and from London, in consequence of his election, is preserved, and, as may be imagined, abounds with interest.

descended from a nephew of Bishop Flambard, and the "tres cher Bachelier" of Bishop Beck. Fitz Marmaduke, at the time of his death, was governor of St. John's Town [Perth,] in Scotland, under Edward II., and, according to a custom then not uncommon, his attendants, finding it impossible to comply with that clause in his will which enjoined his sepulture at Durham, literally boiled his dead body in a large cauldron, and preserved his bones till an opportunity of burying them in the Cathedral-yard of Durham presented itself. The whole of this strange proceeding is given in the following singular record enjoining, a penance upon the agents in the transaction, and now for the first time printed.

The Executors were Sir Henry Fitzhugh and Sir Thomas de Wytheworth, Knights. Of the above inventory the greater part has been printed by Mr. Surtees, Vol. II., p. 381, but in a contracted, and therefore to the general reader an almost unintelligible form. As it has been deemed indispensable in a collection of this nature, the whole is now given free from contractions. The information which it affords relative to the armour and the domestic economy of the period,

the prices of cattle, grain, &c. &c., is most authentic and valuable.

Richard fitz Marmaduke, the son of the above John, was Senescal to Bishop Beaumont, and was murdered upon Framwellgate Bridge, by Robert Neville, of Raby, in 1318.

before the battle of Neville's Cross, his services upon the Borders had obtained for him a pension of £20 per annum, out of the manor of Edrington, in Berwickshire. Twice in 1343 and again in 1344, he was a Commissioner of Truce or Array: but greater rewards and honours awaited him. Ridpath states, without giving his authority, that, for his services upon the field of Durham, he received a pension of £500 per annum. The Rotuli Scotiæ, after this period, make frequent mention of his name, first as Constable of Roxhurgh Castle and Sheriff of the Shire, next as "Custos" of Berwick upon Tweed, and then as Constable and Sheriff of Roxburgh again. In 1353, he held, among his other offices, the Shrievalty of Northumberland, and in that capacity, by a singular coincidence, received at Newcastle David, King of Scotland, on his road home, after a captivity of seven long years. He died before 26th Jan., 1364. The preamble to his will alludes to some distant expedition which he was upon the point of undertaking, and it would appear that the time allowed him for making the necessary preparation was extremely limited, as he merely makes a nuncupative disposition of his effects. The Rotuli Scotiæ, however, make frequent mention of him at this very period as stationed at Berwick, and they record no command to him to quit his official duties. At all events, he died at home, and was buried in the church of Carham, from whence, by licence of Bishop Hatfield, at the petition of Joan, his widow, his body was removed for final sepulture to the Priory of Kirkham, in Yorkshire. To the information which we already possess, relative to the battle of Neville's Cross, may be here added, with propriety, the following original letter written by the Prior to the Bishop of Durham, a few days after the conflict, and hitherto unpublished. The etymological reader will smile when he is told by the Prior that Fyndon Hill, at which the battle terminated, had been originally so called in anticipation of this very event. Fyndonne-Fyn donnè-Finis datus-for the writer is armed both with French and Latin in proof of his point:-

Alexander Neville, Prebendary of Bole, in York Cathedral—consecrated Archbishop of York, 4th June, 1374—espoused the cause of Richard II.—sentenced by the rebellious barons to perpetual imprisonment in the Castle of Rochester; but before he was seized, fled from Cawood in the habit of a poor priest, and escaped beyond the sea—lived in exile and in great poverty till Pope Urban V., upon his formal resignation of the See of York, translated him to the See of St. Andrew's in Scotland; but the Scots refusing to receive him, he became a parish priest and schoolmasier at Lovain, and died in 1392, having spent five years in exile.

Ralph Neville, Lord of Raby-Governor of Carlisle, and a Warden of the Marches, 1385—succeeded to his estates upon the death of his father, in 1388 -Constable of the Tower of London, 1397-Earl of Westmorland in 1398-Lord of the Honor of Penrith for life-Earl of Richmond (for life), and Earl Marshal of England in 1399-Governor of Roxborough Castle, 1401-at the Siege of Caen, in Normandy, 1409-founded the Collegiate Church of Staindrop-married, first, Margaret, daughter of Hugh Earl of Stafford, who died 9th June, 1370, and was buried at Brancepath-secondly. Joan, daughter of John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, widow of Sir Robert Ferrers, Knight, who survived him, and dying 13th Nov., 1440, was buried at Lincoln. The Earl of Westmorland himself died 21st Oct., 1425, and was buried at Staindrop, under the most splendid tomb of which the North of England can boast, but which has been removed from its original situation in the middle of the Choir, into an obscure and dirty corner behind the south door, where, in addition to other indignities, the heat of a stove, hard by, is rapidly pulverising the splendid alabaster work of one of its sides. Ought not such a tomb to have been most carefully preserved in its original situation, as one of the proudest memorials of the antient Lords of Raby? Who was the incumbent who consented to such a barbarous proceeding? Why did not the Ordinary interfere? There are elaborate engravings of this rich specimen of antient art in Gough's Sepulchral Monuments; in Surtees's History of Durham; and in Blore's Monumental Remains. Let the engraver perpetuate what may soon be a matter of history.

We have pleasure in preserving four characteristic letters written by this ill-fated nobleman. The first, which will be read with great interest, must have been written soon after the 15th June, 1429, upon which day the Earl of Salisbury was appointed a Commissioner for the Borders. The postscript of this letter is in the Earl's own hand-writing, and the Prior would doubtless understand its meaning. The second and third are from France, the former in 1431, and the latter about the same period—the fourth, written after the Earl's return to his Castle of Middleham, refers to a dispute between Sir William Bowes and the Prior, relative to the estate of Osmondcroft, on the Tees.

1. TO THE REU'ENT FADER IN GODE & MY RIGHT TRISTY FRENDE THE PRIOR OF DURRESME.

It was first published by Bourne in his History of Newcastle, from whence it was copied by Hodgson; but the slightest comparison of Bourne's copy with the above will prove that he has attended merely to the substance of the record, and has totally disregarded the light which it throws upon the English language of its period.

It had been necessary, at an earlier period, to re-consecrate the Church of Houghton-le-Spring, for a similar reason. During an inroad of the Scots, in the time of Bruce, a villager had concealed himself in the belfry, and, in descending, after the danger was over, had fallen to the ground, and lost his life.

¹ These Inventories contain the IMPLEMENTS and BOOKS of the College of Aukland upon the accession of Willian Thomeson to the Deanery in 1498. Early catalogues of collections of books, public or private, are always peculiarly valuable, for reasons into which we need not here enter. In this case the list will be read with great interest, as the Collegiate Church of Auckland was the School in which many of the young nobility and gentry of the North of England were educated. This fact seems to be proved by the following extract from the yearly Account Roll of Nicholas Kelchith, who was clerk of the works to Bishop Booth. "Solut' Johanni Robson carpentario, super factura ij novorum lectorum bord apud Denry ex mandato Domini pro pueris Domini ffezhw et Domini lovell ixd." Each bed, therefore, cost 4½d. The sons of Lord Fitzhugh, in the above year, were Richard, then 12 years of age, and John, Thomas, George, and Edward, one or more of whom might, perhaps, he at school with their brother. The son of Lord Lovel was Francis, afterwards Lord Lovel himself, and then eight years of age.

This Inventory is particularly valuable for the light which it throws upon the domestic economy of a person of this rank at the period. The deceased farmed a portion of his own land. He grew his own corn, and he heckled, or combed, and then spun his own flax and wool; he killed his own beef, and there are numerous other curious inferences to be drawn from this document.

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THE SURTEES SOCIETY.

Copy of a Letter, explaining the objects of the Society, circulated with the outlines of its proposed Rules, as agreed upon at a Preliminary Meeting held on the 17th of April, 1834, subject to the revision and amendments of the Meeting of the 27th of May following [1834], when the Society was to be established:—

SIR,

Several Gentlemen of literary character, personal friends of the late ROBERT SURTEES, of Mainsforth, Esq. the Author of the splendid and elaborate History of the County Palatine of Durham, of which three volumes are already published, and the fourth far advanced in the press, have requested me, as the intimate friend of Mr. Surtees for the last twenty years, his coadjutor in the Topography of the Palatinate, and the person solicited by Mrs. Surtees to complete the History which he has left imperfect, to transmit to you the preceding outlines of the Rules of a Society which they are anxious to establish in honor of his name. They are of opinion, that the foundation of a Society of the above nature, and for the above purposes, would be the best mode of evincing their respect for the Memory of one not more distinguished for his talents and attainments, than for his exalted character as an English gentleman. They conceive that a monument of this nature, combining a permanency more durable than brass or marble, with a purpose of great public utility, will the most strongly express their grief for the loss which they and the general cause of literature have sustained, and best accord with the feelings of him whom they lament, knowing, as they do, that if he had survived the completion of the work in which he was engaged, it was his intention to devote a portion of his time to the publication of more than one Manuscript comprised within their plan, now, like the other valuable Authors which they propose to bring to light, buried in the public or private libraries of the kingdom.

To illustrate very briefly the nature of the object they have in view, in order that some opinion may be formed of its utility, they beg to point out to public notice a very few only of the hitherto inedited Manuscripts connected with Durham alone,-MSS. which, in these times, few individuals would incur the risk of printing at their own cost; but which, nevertheless, afford even singly, how much more so collectively, the most valuable materials to those who are anxious to study rightly the History of our forefathers, under its different characters.

I. The Saxon interlineation of the Latin Ritual of Alcfrid, King of Northumberland (686-705) upon which Wanley has bestowed so much attention in Hickes's Thesaurus, and which has never yet been printed. There never was a time when greater attention was paid to the Saxon Language, as the very foundation of the English tongue, than at the present day; and yet this book, with all the additions it can make to the glossary of its period, is totally unknown to the philologist.

II. The Saxon interlineation of the Vulgate N. T. of Cuthbert, Bishop of

Lindisfarne, (685-688) equally valuable and equally unknown.

III. Bede. Ob. Anno. 735. Of the various writings of this Venerable Au. thor, printed in the collected edition of his Works, many, it is believed, are not his: but at all events, there are at least ten of his Treatises which have not hitherto been given to the public. The name of Bede requires no comment.

IV. The LIBER VITE, or Book of Benefactors to the Church of Durham from its foundation at Lindisfarne to the Dissolution; written in its earlier pages in letters of gold and silver, and preserved in the British Museum; containing a mass of the most interesting information.

V. The Prose and Poetical Works of Laurence, Prior of Durham, who died

VI. The History of Reginald, a Monk of Durham, who flourished in the middle of the twelfth century. This Author professes to write a continuation of the Miracles of St. Cuthbert, as an Appendix to those recorded by Bede; and in so doing, in recording much of the popular creed of his day with respect to miracles, details, like every other early hagiographer, very many hitherto unknown facts, illustrative of local and even of general History.

VII. Various Catalogues of the Monastic Library of the Church of Durham

and its Cells, from the time of Richard the Second to the Dissolution. Such documents as these are, beyond measure, illustrative of the literature of their

respective periods.
VIII. The Theological and Historical Works of John Wessington, Prior of

Durham from 1416 to 1446.

IX. A Catalogue of the Malefactors who fled for refuge to the Shrine of St. Cuthbert, from the earliest recorded instance till the abolition of sanctuary, with the nature of their crimes. A publication of this nature would of necessity throw great light upon the comparative prevalence of crime and the general state of society of the north of England, during the period over which it extends.

X. The Meditations of Ughtred, a Monk of Durham, during his solitary life upon Farne Island, in the thirteenth century.

In drawing up the above brief list of inedited Authors or Documents, by way of specimen of the objects contemplated by the Society, Durham alone has been taken into consideration: and even with respect to Durham, there is much unpublished matter not here noticed. When the wide field embraced by the Society is considered, it will be manifest, that there can be no apprehension of a lack of Authors, of equal or superior importance, to engage its notice.

If it should be your wish, as a personal friend of the late Mr. Surtees, or as a favourer of the general cause of Literature, to promote the object we have in view, by becoming a Member of our proposed Society, may I beg leave to hear from you at your earliest convenience to that effect, and to solicit your attendance at Durham on the 27th of May next. If you should be unable to comply with the latter part of my request, any alterations in our proposed Rules, which you may deem it expedient to suggest to me, will be carefully taken into consideration.

RULES, &c.

A MEETING was held at the Queen's Head Inn, Dur-HAM, at one o'clock P.M., on TUESDAY, the 27th of May, 1834, JOHN RALPH FENWICK, Esq., M.D., in the Chair, for the Establishment of a LITERARY SOCIETY, to be called

THE SURTEES SOCIETY,

In honour of the late Robert Surtes, of Mainsforth, Esquire, the Author of the History of the County Palatine of Durham, and in accordance with his pursuits and plans; to have for its object the Publication of inedited Manuscripts, illustrative of the intellectual, the moral, the religious, and the social condition of those parts of England and Scotland, included on the East between the Humber and the Frith of Forth, and on the West between the Mersey and the Clyde, a region which constituted the Antient Kingdom of Northumberland. The following Rules were then agreed upon:

THE SURTEES SOCIETY

I. Shall consist of an unlimited number of Members, out of whom shall be triennially elected a President, twelve Vice-Presidents, two Treasurers, and a Secretary, who shall constitute the Council. Of this number five, including the Secretary and one of the Treasurers, shall be capable of acting as a meeting. The President shall be ineligible a second time until three years shall have elapsed from his departure from the office. The other Members of the Council shall be capable of being re-elected.

II. The Officers of the Society shall be elected at each Third Annual Meeting. Any vacancy which may occur in the Offices of Treasurer or Secretary

shall be provisionally filled up by the Council.

III. Those gentlemen who have assented, or do now assent, to the general principle of its proposed Rules and Regulations, and have signified their wish to become Members, shall be deemed original Members of the Society. In the case of persons applied to previously to the 27th of May, by Mr. Raine, at the request of the Preliminary Meeting of the 17th of April, and from whom no answer has been received, the list shall be left open till the first of July next.

request of the Preliminary Meeting of the 17th of April, and from whom no answer has been received, the list shall be left open till the first of July next.

IV. Subsequent Members shall be elected by Ballot at the Anniversary; each Candidate having been proposed by a Member in a letter, post-paid, addressed to the Secretary, two months before the day of meeting. The Members

present at the Anniversary shall alone be entitled to vote. One black ball in

ten shall exclude.

V. Each Member shall pay to the Treasurers an Annual Subscription of two guineas in advance. The sum so raised shall be expended in transcribing and publishing, in a closely-printed octavo form, such inedited Manuscripts as illustrate the intellectual, the moral, the religious, and the social condition of those parts of England and Scotland, included within the above lines of demarcation, from the earliest period to the time of the Restoration,—every thing, in short, which has a tendency to throw light upon the mind, the morals, or the habits of our ancestors. No apartments shall be hired, except for the Annual Meeting. No collection of Books or of any other nature shall be formed. The Subscriptions, and the money arising from the sale of Books under a subsequent Rule, shall be solely devoted to the transcribing of MSS, the expenses of the press, and other incidental expenses.

VI. The Council shall itself supply matter for the press for the first year. Afterwards it shall annually call upon twenty Members, in alphabetical order, for notices of MSS. which they who are applied to would recommend to be printed. These notices shall be sent to the Secretary within a prescribed time, accompanied by the Manuscript itself, or an analysis of its contents. But in no instance shall any Member be applied to by the Council a second time until each Member shall have had an opportunity of recommending a MS. or of

waiving his turn.

VII. No MS. shall be sent to the press by the Council, without the sanction of a majority of the Members. In order to obtain this sanction, the Council shall, by their Secretary, transmit to each Member, upon a single sheet, a condensed printed account of the various analyses which have been submitted for consideration. This sheet each Member will return to the Secretary, with a mark in the margin opposite to those MSS. of which he approves the publication. The Council may, if it think fit, point out, as a matter of opinion, such in particular as it approves. The votes of Members, who return no answer, shall be at the disposal of the Council. When there is a deficiency of matter in any year, that deficiency shall be supplied by the Council.

VIII. The expense of transcribing for the press every MS. of which the publication is determined upon, under the above Rules, shall be defrayed by the Society, if the Member by whom it has been proposed should require it.

IX. No matter shall be printed in connection with any MS, save what is necessary for its illustration. A short biographical account of its Author, and brief Notes illustrative of his phraseology, and of the customs and manners and opinions of his time, will be permitted to a reasonable extent, with the modern names of the places which he mentions, and occasional notices of persons who occur in his writings. The Council shall have a discretionary power of rejecting any additions of the contributor which do not, in their opinion, come within these limitations.

X. The number of copies of each publication shall be regulated by the Council. Of these one shall be given to each Member, whose subscription is not in arrear. The rest, of which the Council shall in each case determine the number, shall be sold at the price it shall appoint. The money raised by sale to go to the general fund.

XI. The Armorial Bearings of Mr. Surtees and some other characteristic decoration connecting the Society with his name, shall be used in each publication. These embellishments shall be determined upon by the Council.

XII. The selection of a Printer and Publisher shall be left to the Council. XIII. A List of Officers and Members, with an account of the receipts, expenses, and general proceedings of the Society, shall be annually printed, of an uniform size with its publications, and transmitted to each Member.

uniform size with its publications, and transmitted to each Member.

XIV. An Anniversary shall be held in Durham, on the second Tuesday in July, in each year, for the regulation of the affairs of the Society. The first

Anniversary to be held on the second Tuesday in July, 1835. The Council

shall have the power of calling extraordinary Meetings.

XV. The Society shall be answerable for no expense which may be incurred at the Anniversary Meetings, save the hire of a Room for the transaction of its business.

XVI. No alterations shall be made in these Rules, except at an Anniversary Three months' notice of the alterations proposed shall be submitted to each Member.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

SURTEES SOCIETY,

READ AT THE FIRST ANNIVERSARY HELD AT THE WATERLOO
HOTEL, DURHAM, JULY 14, 1835,
GEORGE TAYLOR, ESQ., VICE-PRESIDENT, IN THE CHAIR,
AND ORDERED TO BE PRINTED.

THE Council of the Surtees Society beg to lay before its Members the following particulars relative to the state and prospects of the Institution, in compliance with its 13th rule.

The present state of the Society is in every respect of the most gratifying and encouraging nature. When its institution was first proposed, although it combined the object of doing honour to the memory of a gentleman who had most disinterestedly and successfully devoted his rare talents and acquirements to the benefit of the public, with a plan of great public utility, long contemplated by himself, yet, even with these purposes in view, the most sanguine of its promoters did not feel themselves justified in anticipating for the first year that more than fifty members would join their intended Society. That they had greatly under-rated the extent of respectful feeling for the memory of Mr. Surtees, which existed among his personal friends and acquaintances, and the anxiety of those who had not known him to co-operate with them in paying a public and most characteristic tribute of respect to the memory of one to whom such a tribute was most pre-eminently due, by benefiting at the same time the literary public at large, has been abundantly proved. The anticipated number of Members has been more than doubled. The Society, even in the very first year of its existence, has upon its list one hundred and seven Members, many of them ranking among the very highest literary characters

in the kingdom; and its Council have great pleasure in announcing that there are not fewer than twenty-five candidates for admission this day, all of whom are influenced by the same deep feeling of respect for the memory of Mr. Surtees, and the same anxiety to promote the great public purpose which the Society has in view.

When the nature of the two main objects of the Society is considered, its Council cannot refrain from expressing their confidence that its numbers will continue to increase, and its usefulness be, in consequence, promoted. The field, of which it has taken possession, has been hitherto totally unoccupied by any past or present association of literary men; and that a most abundant harvest may be reaped, even within the limits which it has prescribed to itself, will be manifest to any one acquainted with the Manuscript Catalogues of the public or private Libraries of the Kingdom. The objects which it embraces are of so general a nature, and the authors whose works come within its rules are so numerous and important, that there is no one single department of literature which may not eventually be benefited by its labours. The appellation of an Antiquarian Society, which has in more than one instance been applied to it by persons who appear not to comprehend and appreciate its real objects, it unequivocally rejects, in the usual acceptation of the term. It aims at men and manners, and leaves the painful and seldom appreciated County Historian or Parochial Topographer in full occupation of his field. It meddles not with descent of property and blood, or with heraldic or numismatic lore. It does not despise these auxiliary aids in the elucidation of historic or moral truth; on the contrary, it will avail itself of their assistance when need may require-but such investigations as constitute the leading object of our various Societies of Antiquaries, form no part of its plan. Neither can its proceedings interfere with those of the Record Commission, the object of which is to make known, under the authority of Government, the substance of those of the most important of our national and legal Records which are preserved in the official repositories of the kingdom. There exists another Commission, if it may be so termed, at the head of which stands a gentleman whose name, as a Member, does honour to the Surtees Society; a gentleman intimately acquainted with the late Mr. Surtees, and well qualified to appreciate his character as a County Historian. About twelve years ago, it was determined by the House of Commons, "That a plan should be devised for collecting, arranging, and publishing the materials for the History of Britain from the earliest times to the accession of Henry VIII." Mr. Petrie, of whom we speak, the Keeper of the National Records preserved in the Tower, was very judiciously selected as the person best qualified to devise a scheme for this mighty undertaking, and carry it into effect; and since that time he has devoted himself exclusively to the task. Possessing, as he does, the most extensive knowledge of our old Historians, and the degree of authenticity and veracity, or the contrary, which may be conceded to them, much may be expected from his labours; the more, perhaps, that he has taken due time to mature his plans-to reject the fabulous, and condense the truth. Now, to Mr. Petrie, the Historical Publications of the Surtees Society must, of necessity, be of the greatest value in the collections and arrangements in which he is engaged. There are many dark periods of English History upon which our public authorities throw only a glimmering light; and it is possible that some Author, brought before the world by the Surtees Society, after a sleep of many centuries, may essentially contribute to dispel the obscurities of the time in which he lived. By one such resuscitation, if we may so term it, History may be a great gainer; but what if numerous other authors may be found, pressi longa nocte, who, by the combined and steady light which they are able to throw upon the dark portions of our national history, leave us nothing further to wish for!

The Council of the Society beg to suggest that these are all

weighty considerations for exertion; and they cannot refrain from expressing a confident hope, founded upon the encouragement which the Society has already received, and the progress which it has made, that the time may arrive when its funds may justify the extension of its operations, and when, no longer confined to the Saxon Kingdom of Northumberland, it may consider the whole of Britain as the field of its labours.

From these anticipations of the future, the Council call the attention of the Members of the Society to the matter of fact proceedings of the year which this day closes.

At a meeting of the Council, to whom the sixth rule gives the selection of the first year's publications, held on the 4th of December last, it was "determined that

"Four hundred copies of a MS., hitherto unpublished, entitled Reginaldi Monachi Dunelmensis de admirandis Beati Cuthberti virtutibus quæ novellis patratæ sunt temporibus,' be printed by the Society, the manuscript to be transcribed for the press under the direction of the Secretary, and at the expense of the Society." And it was also "ordered

"That four hundred copies of a selection from unpublished Wills and Inventories, of all classes of persons, from the eleventh century downwards, illustrating the History, Manners, Language, Statistics, &c., of their respective periods, to be transcribed under the superintendence of the Secretary, be also printed."

The first of these orders has been carried into full effect. Reginald the Monk is now public property, and whatever he contains of historical, or otherwise valuable matter, is before the world. The Council do not deem it necessary to draw the attention of the Society more particularly to the matters of history or fact detailed in this volume, as they are concisely alluded to in the Preface, which it has been considered expedient to prefix to it, and are still more minutely specified in an appended abstract of each chapter. With respect to the archaisms of our author, and other matter interesting to the Philologist, a Glossary

has been added, which, it is hoped, will sufficiently explain such terms as may be new to those versed only in pure latinity. Indexes of men and places have been subjoined; and the apology for the imperfections of his compilation, which Reginald thought it necessary to make to the venerable Abbot of Rievaulx, to whom he dedicated it, let him now make to the world; and let him hope for the same favourable judgment on the merits of his performance which he doubtless received at the hands of Ethelred.

"De quibus omnibus," says he, "compacto libello, vobis transcurrendum transmittimus, et vestro examini propriè reservavimus. Erit igitur vestræ providentiæ, minùs decenter dicta immutando polire, deficientia vel omissa replendo substituere, supersticiosa vel pervacua delendo descidere, singula æquæ discretionis modulamine ponderare. Quæ vero vobis complacurint, testificando veritati certiora efficere; quæ autem in beneplacito vestro non sederint, moderato æquitatis libramine complanando corrigere."

The selection of Wills is so far advanced in the press, that it will be completed in three weeks, and the public will be put in possession of a series of the most authentic documents, abound. ing with the most valuable and novel information. commences with the year 1095, and comes down to the year It will consist of about four hundred and thirty pages, three hundred and fifty of which are already printed; a brief temporary Introduction will be given along with it, drawing the attention of the reader to some of the more important matters which it elucidates; and an Index of Testators, &c. will be appended. These arrangements are made, partly because there will be no time for more minute and copious details and indexes, but chiefly because it is hoped by the Council that the proposal to continue the series of Wills and Inventories down to the year 1660, made by Mr. Allan, one of its Members, may eventually be carried into effect, when a general Preface, a full abstract of the valuable matter the two volumes will contain in illustration of almost every point in the history of our ancestors, and copious Indexes, will be required and supplied.

At the meeting held on the 4th December, above mentioned, the Secretary was directed to put in force that part of the sixth rule which enjoins him to call annually upon twenty Members, in alphabetical order, to supply matter for the press for the ensuing year. This order has been complied with, and letters have been received in which not fewer than seven subjects have been proposed, all of them, save one, apparently worthy of the serious attention of the Society. Although, by rule the 7th, it is not within the province of this meeting to decide which of these MSS. shall be printed, and which not, yet the Council beg to specify the subjects which have been proposed, and relative to which a circular will ere long be addressed to each Member, in conformity with that rule:—

- 1. A Selection from the Townley Plays, the MS. of which is written in the Dialect of Lancashire. Temp. H. vi.
- 2. Vita Oswini Regis Deirorum, et de miraculis ejus.
- 3. Watson's History of Durham. MS., about 1570.
- 4. Chartulary of Coldstream.
- 5. Registrum Cartarum de Holm juxta Alnwic.
- Divers Catalogues of the Library of the Monks of Durham, the first dated in 1391.
- 7. A Continuation of the volume of Wills and Inventories.

That seven such subjects as the above should be in one year proposed, is a sufficient proof that the Society has upon its list men who thoroughly understand its objects, and are anxious to benefit it by their labours.
