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

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

PENNSYLVANIA-GERMAN SOCIETY

AT 1TS

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING

Held at Reading, Pa.

ON FRIDAY, OCTOBER 27, 1905

THE Executive Committee of the Society held its regular quarterly meeting in the rooms of the Historical Society of Berks County, 519 Court Street, Reading, Pa., at 8:00 P. M., on Thursday, October 26, for the transaction of its business.

MORNING SESSION.

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Pennsylvania-German Society was held in the chapel of St. Paul's Memorial Reformed Church, on North Sixth Street, Reading, Pa., on Friday, October 27, 1905, and was largely attended.

The meeting was called to order by the President, the

Hon. James Addams Beaver, LL.D., late Brigadier General, U. S. V., Civil War, late Governor of Pennsylvania, President Judge Superior Court of Pennsylvania, at 9:30 A. M.

After an impressive invocation by the Rev. F. J. F. Schantz, D.D., of Myerstown, Pa., the Society was welcomed to Reading, in a most kindly manner by the Hon. Gustav A. Endlich, LL.D., Judge of the Berks County Courts.

Address of Welcome.

At the threshold of the 15th annual meeting of the Pennsylvania-German Society, it is my pleasant duty and my privilege on behalf of the local membership to welcome you in our midst. It needs but few words to convey this cordial greeting. We are heartily glad to see you, and we trust that your brief stay among us may be as agreeable and profitable to you as it is sure to be to us.

You are here in the very heart and center of the Pennsylvania-German people. I almost feel constrained to apologize for not addressing you in its own peculiar ver-- nacular. But you know they insist on printing everything that is said at these meetings, and unfortunately as yet every one has his own way of spelling in Pennsylvania-German; so that nobody, or hardly anybody, can make sense of what any other has written. If it were not for the lack of a distinctive alphabet, or at least a settled orthography, the Pennsylvania-German language might have a literature and a title to preservation. And vet its preservation is not essential. I do not understand it to be a purpose of this society. Among the things that will strike you here, the most noteworthy will not be the occasional use of an idiom characteristic of the race to which you belong and recalling you to the consciousness of

your ancestry. You will be more interested to find everywhere the marks of its creditable history, the traces of its heroic struggles, the evidences of its prudent relations with the savages as well as of its ready amalgamation with neighbors and new-comers of kindred European nationality, and the enduring proofs of its toil and thrift Pushed always towards the frontier; and usefulness. hewing its way through the wilds; fighting the wolves of the forest and the gaunt wolf of starvation; facing and overcoming the merciless forces of nature; soothing the fierce temper of the Indians by fair treatment; receiving on equal terms and with helpful sympathy settlers from every clime seeking shelter in their wake; insensibly, by force of friendly association, imposing their own language and habits of thought and life upon these strangers; mingling with them, importing to them that priceless heritage of the Teutonic race, the principle of personal freedom, of self-help and of the dignity and worth of the individual; rearing its youth in a simple, practical faith; toiling, hasteless and tireless, at his appointed task of making the wilderness to blossom as a rose-such, in the early days of our country, was the part played by the people who dwelt in these regions.

You will stand to-day upon the summit of Mt. Penn. Towards the east you will look out upon the hills of Alsace and Ruscombmanor townships, the name of the one bearing witness to the German origin of its settlers and calling to mind the honorable cause of their immigration; the name of the other, though peopled by the same stock, as English as English can be. Beyond those hills you will catch glimpses of the fertile farms of what was called by the Indians, and is now the township of Oley, "the land encompassed by hills," the refuge of

many a French Huguenot family. To the south your eye, passing lingeringly over the beautiful valley that stretches through Exeter, will rest upon the stately Neversink and the Flying Bird Hills beyond-names borrowed by the pioneers from their Indian neighbors. Again, to the west you will see Cumru, settled by the Welsh, and turning still further the Heidelbergs, Spring, Penn, Bern, Ontelaunee and so on-German, English, Indian names alternating as you complete the circle of your view. Each name tells its tale of the past, part of the story of a sturdy people, of wise husbandry, of hospitality, of moderation and conservatism, of respect for the rights of others, of love of liberty, of hard work, of suffering and endurance and success. I speak of this proudly to you with whom I share the honor of descent from such a race, and who with me are committed to the duty of enforcing recognition of its achievements.

How deeply interested we all are in the performance of this duty is attested by the gathering here to-day. Ι don't want to say anything against any former meeting. But I do think this is the most distinguished and the best looking we have ever had. It seems almost as though the days of Pennsylvania-Dutch Governors had come back And what can I say by way of adequately exto us. pressing my sense of the many other attractions of and in my audience? Ladies and gentlemen, having come to this point, I realize that safety lies in brevity. I shall, therefore, only repeat what I began with-that in behalf of the Berks County members of the Society I bid you all most welcome.

The response to this welcome was eloquently made by Joseph L. Lemberger, Ph.M., of Lebanon, Pa., as follows:

run quite a distance, and if, perchance, he caught a root the rebound would be sufficient to throw him to the ground. His sources of amusement were those common to the country, with a chance visit, on special occasions, to Reading, but a few miles distant, then a village of less than two thousand inhabitants, which doubtless looked as great in his eyes as does now, to the more experienced traveler, the busy, prosperous and beautiful city of 100,000 people to which it has since grown.

Opportunities for the acquisition of an education are generally denied the pioneer settler, who removes himself and family far from the places where learning is taught. But, whilst this rule holds good with probably every other nationality, it does not hold good in the case of the German emigrant. Coming, as he did, from a land where it was discreditable to lack in the ordinary rudiments of knowledge, and, imbued as he was, with a strong religious sentiment, his first care, in his new home, was to erect a log church and procure a pastor, so that whilst the body was well cared for the soul might not lack its still more important "bread of life"; his next step was the establishment of a parochial school in connection with the church, that there might be no want of nourishment for the brain. This school was held at times in the church during the week, but rather, when possible, in a separate building erected for the purpose. Occasionally instruction was imparted by the pastor himself, but, more generally, by a school-master, whose position was second only to that of the clergyman. But, whether pastor or school-master, he was always an educated man, and the knowledge thus received became so solid a foundation that on it many a pupil was enabled to rear a lasting and beautiful fabric. Such a school had the old Bern church, situate about one

what would some localities in this favored land not give, if their history possessed the colonial tint this county has?

Our Pennsylvania-German history is so full of these sacred memories that, in passing, we can only allude to some of those worthy heroes directly associated with Berks County.

You must think of the early Swedes, the Quakers, the Mennonites, the Moravians, the Lutherans and the Reformed, and as we are reminded of their suffering, selfdenial, sacrifice and fortitude, we may allude to one of the principal characters, Count Zinzendorf, who only a short distance from where we are assembled, as the historian has it: "Was alone in his tent, seated upon a bundle of dry weeds, when the assassins approached to execute their nefarious and bloody mission. It was night, and the cool air of September had rendered a small fire necessary to his comfort and convenience. A curtain formed of a blanket and hung upon pins, was the only guard to the entrance of his tent. The heat of his small fire has roused a rattlesnake which lay in the weeds not far from it; and the reptile, to enjoy it more effectually, crawled slowly into the tent. Without, all was still and quiet, except the gentle murmur of the river at the rapids, a mile below. At this moment, the Indians softly approached the door of his tent, and slightly removing the curtain, contemplated the venerable man too deeply engaged in the subject of his thoughts, to notice either their approach, or the snake which lay extended before him. At a sight like this, even the heart of the savage shrunk from committing so horrid an act, and quitting the spot they hastily returned to the town and informed their companions that the Great Spirit protected the white man." Thus was he divinely protected that he might be

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a factor, evangelizing and civilizing the people they found there.

We also think of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg and Conrad Weiser, and the great work accomplished by them, and I may be pardoned for my allusion to a spirit of personal ancestral pride, when I say to the good people of Berks County that my own mother was born a short distance outside of the precincts of your beautiful city, through which circumstance I feel it is quite fitting that I perform this pleasant duty, and feel myself more closely related to you.

Again in the name of the association I represent we express our heartfelt thanks for the welcome extended.

The annual address of the President, the Hon. James Addams Beaver, LL.D., of Bellefonte, Pa., was then read.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Members of the Pennsylvania-German Society:

My first prepared word is one of grateful appreciation for the honor which you did me a year ago in selecting me as your president. It is true that the request preceding my election was accompanied by the announcement that there were no duties connected with the office, except that of delivering the annual address, and I have found in my experience that the statement was literally true. But it is nevertheless an honor not to be lightly esteemed to be even the figurehead of such a goodly craft as that of the Pennsylvania-German Society. Having accepted the place with the knowledge of the one duty connected with it, I comply with the requirement of the position and the by-law of the Society, in addressing you now, with some practical suggestions which I hope may be of ser-




vice in determining the place to be occupied by the Society in relation to its larger connections with the commonwealth outside of itself. The distinguished men who have preceded me in this office have earned the gratitude of the Society and of the people of the commonwealth by the manner in which this duty has been performed. They have, in their several annual addresses, built up a body of historical and biographical literature which tells not only who we are and who have been and are still of us, but has also indicated the characteristics-physical, mental and moral—which have made the people of our blood and lineage a great formative influence and preponderating power in the building of our body politic, and has pointed out with more or less of definite detail and satisfactory fullness, the various sources and the varied courses of that rich stream of immigration which, although mingling with other streams from many different directions, has maintained itself with such surprising distinctness of language, manners, customs and characteristics, and which has added so much to the solidity, strength, sobriety and stability of society in our goodly commonwealth.

Our Society stands, as it must in its very nature, and as the underlying reason of its organization and existence, for two distinct things, or, rather, two definite ideas: first, that of indebtedness to the past, and, second, that of duty to the future; the latter almost necessarily grows out of the former. If we are indebted to the past, we must pay that debt to the future, hence, obligation—duty. My predecessors have, as was most meet and necessary, dealt for the most part with the first of these ideas—indebtedness to the past. Who were our fathers? Whence came they? What the reason for their coming? What have they done? What influence have they exerted, and

how have they wrought in the founding and rearing of the church and the state? What part have they played in ecclesiastical, civil and military affairs? What have they contributed by pen and speech and sword toward the establishment of a firm basis of civil and religious liberty? How have they assisted in the establishment and development of trade and commerce? In what way and to what extent are science and art, learning and literature indebted to them? These, and other questions of like character, have been answered, at least in part, by my predecessors. These, and a hundred other questions of like character, crowd upon us now. They deserve to be answered. They ought to be answered. To some extent, they have been answered; and, just in proportion as they have been, and shall hereafter be, fully and fairly answered, just in that proportion do we discover the rich heritage which we have in our ancestry, and the great debt we owe to those who have gone before us; and just in that proportion will we discover the great load of obligation which rests upon us, and which we must discharge to those who are to come after us.

What is to be the final American type? What will be the characteristics—physical, mental and moral, of the future citizens of this country, when we shall have developed in its finality the outcome of our civilization and the fundamental ideas upon which our government and other institutions rest? We have probably not yet gathered from the different sources which are to contribute to this final character, all the elements which are to enter into it, and we are probably, therefore, not ready as yet to answer the question fully. But it must be evident to any one who has given thoughtful attention to the subject, that the American character, as it is to be finally de-




veloped, will be a composite. If the characteristics which are now being developed in various ways, in different parts of our country, are those which are to prevail in the final American type, we at least may be pardoned if we surrender with regret the characteristics of slow-going, steady and sturdily honest and thrifty Pennsylvania Germans for those which have been brought to the surface by recent development. We must recognize the fact, however, that the different streams of immigration which have flowed hither in the past, and are tending to flow with greater volume and force, cannot remain distinct; that there will necessarily be in the future, as there has been in the past, more or less of commingling, until, in the process of time, we shall develop a distinct type suited to our situation and environment, to be known as the American type. This will not come in our day, nor in that of our children; but, if the life of the nation is prolonged as is probable, this would seem to be inevitable. Within the present generation there has been a great change in manners, customs, habits and language of cur Pennsylvania Germans. When I came to the bar less than half a century ago it was rare to pass a term of court at which there were witnesses called who could not or would not give their testimony in any language save the Pennsylvania German. This scarcely ever occurs in our community now, although not rare, perhaps, here, but this change must in the nature of things continue and it is only an illustration of what I wish to convey.

This leads me to offer a few suggestions as to the duty which we, as an organization of the descendants of our Pennsylvania-German ancestry, owe to the future, and as to the manner in which that duty is to be discharged. As has been formerly remarked, our ancestors were not given

to much speech about themselves. They were content to do without boasting or even talking of what they were doing. The result is that the world knows little of the strength and volume of that quiet, steady, persistent stream of usefulness and helpfulness which has come through our ancestors into the life and up-building of our great commonwealth. We of this generation, therefore, owe it to ourselves to tell in such graphic way as we can, and gather into such permanent form as may be, the influence of that steady stream which for nearly two hundred years has been exerting itself for the manifest good of the general community. As I have before intimated, much has already been done in this direction by the publications of this Society, as they have grown in volume and importance, and they are not surpassed by those of any other organization of a similar kind in the country. assume, of course, that these publications are to continue to grow in the future as in the past in their value as a contribution to the full and final record of achievement by our ancestors. It must be recognized, however, that these publications have a very limited circulation, and that even now it is impossible to secure copies of the entire series, by reason of the fact that the earlier volumes are out of print.

We have in Pennsylvania, as you all know, what is doubtless a child of our organization, the magazine now in its sixth year, known as The Pennsylvania German. As this little quarterly is to be issued hereafter bi-monthly, and is to assume more pretentious proportions, it seems to me that the members of this Society should interest themselves in giving the largest possible circulation to the magazine, and in contributing to its pages recollections of the past and reminiscences of persons and places which



will convey to the world at large a better idea of who the Pennsylvania-Germans were, what they have done, and what permanent contribution has been made by them, through their well-known characteristics, toward the upbuilding and general welfare of our state and nation. I do not enlarge upon this thought, because it would not seem to be necessary to emphasize it, in view of the fact that our very organization stands for this as one of its chief aims and objects. But it is to be remembered, and cannot be too often or too fully spoken of, that this generation, and particularly the older portion of it, has a mass of knowledge and a body of tradition which, if not embalmed by the preservative of all arts now, must be finally lost to the world.

Another practical way in which our members may render assistance along the same lines is to aid in the organization of historical societies in the various counties of the commonwealth. Some of our older counties have accomplished wonders in what has been done in the way of rescuing and preserving local history and biography, and in gathering, as illustrative of the manners and customs of former generations, the quaint and curious implements and articles of everyday use which contributed to their convenience and comfort. One of the best of these societies-that of Bucks County-has erected a permanent building of its own and has thus assured the preservation and the perpetuity-so far as such things can be perpetuated-of their collection. If the influence of the members of our Society could be made to tell in the organization and maintenance of such societies in the counties where the Pennsylvania-German element is dominant, we would be accomplishing a great deal in the discharge of the duty which we owe to the future. It would not be

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wise, perhaps, nor is it expedient, that we should build up, either in the State or in our several counties, historical societies of our own, and yet by exerting the influence which the members of this Society have in their various localities, we could utilize the facilities of the societies already established, so as to preserve what is to us especially valuable in the history and traditions of the people in whom we are so much interested. For example, the Historical Society of Pennsylvania is organized upon broad lines which would doubtless enable us to coöperate with it and secure such recognition as might make the collections of this Society permanently safe and would add value and additional attraction to the collections of the Historical Society itself.

In like manner also, is it not entirely practicable, by a slight increase in the annual dues of the members, or in securing special contributions from those who have the matter at heart, to increase the edition of our annual publications and place copies of them in carefully selected depositories in libraries of historical societies or of colleges or of other local well-established public libraries, and thus bring within the reach of the general reader and of the investigator of the future, the mass of material which gives a clearer comprehension and a more definite view of who our fathers were and what they did?

A Pennsylvania-German department or alcove established, built up and maintained under the auspices of this Society in coöperation with the Librarian at the State Library at Harrisburg seems to be entirely practicable and feasible. The excellent foundation already laid there could be easily built upon under judicious direction and generous encouragement so as to add materially to the value and usefulness of the library itself, the enrichment

of its historical and biographical treasures, the development of the true idea of a State library and the practical usefulness of our Society.

You will gather from these simple suggestions that I believe in our past—that we have a past worth preserving —that it can be preserved and that we have the ability and practical sense to preserve it if we but undertake the task in a common sense way actuated by high motives and governed by the persistency characteristic of our race.

I do not undervalue the work our Society has done nor do I underestimate the influence it has exerted, but it is my firm belief that the work can be greatly enlarged and its influence almost indefinitely extended, first by a systematic effort to increase its membership, and, second, by a multiplication and enlargement of the channels through which its influence is to be exerted. The increase in membership I believe to be within the limits of easy attainment. A slight advance in dues to say five dollars per annum, to which no one could or would object if a definite and worthy object were presented to the members, would secure an income sufficient for the maintenance of an executive officer and office force which would ensure in the end an endowment and annual income which would amply provide for the enlarged work which is barely outlined and hinted at herein.

These suggestions are not the result of sudden thought and are not engendered by an enthusiasm created by the sound of my own voice as I dictated them, but they have been gradually forming and growing in my mind ever since my connection with our Society, and I began to think of a good reason for its existence, and a worthy object for the exercise of its latent possibilities. I do not expect them to be enthusiastically received or hur-

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riedly adopted. We are not in the habit of doing things in that way. But if next year or the year after we should raise a committee to consider the whole subject and carefully consider the ways and means for carrying into effect the general object herein so crudely presented my object will have been attained and I shall be fully content whatever the result.

The executive officers who have been called upon to administer the affairs of our Society have served it and us with a singleness of purpose and devotion to duty worthy of all commendation. How they have been able to do so much and yet devote themselves to the discharge of other duties it is difficult to understand. But we have no right to expect such service for the indefinite future nor are we likely to be able to secure it. The publications of the Society are and will continue to be the enduring monument of their faithfulness and efficiency.

The reverence for age and the worship of their ancestors are redeeming characteristics of Chinese civilization. The latter is based upon the distinct teaching of Confucius and exerts a powerful influence upon the life and character of that singular people. We may not adopt the object of their worship as such, but as we worship the God of our fathers may we not devoutly thank him for our godly ancestry and as the evidence of our gratitude hold them in profound and grateful remembrance and portray them to the world as best we can as worthy the admiration, the gratitude and the honor of all men?

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The annual report of the Secretary, H. M. M. Richards, of Lebanon, Pa., was then read.

To the Officers and Members of the Pennsylvania-German Society, Gentlemen:


It gives your Secretary pleasure to report the continued prosperity of our Society. Its publications have in no wise retrograded from the high standard previously attained; its Executive Committee and officers have faithfully attended to the duties assigned them; all its affairs have been wisely conducted, and its membership continues to increase.

Because of this fact an extended report on my part seems to be unnecessary, and I, therefore, beg merely to say that our roll of members, on October 27, 1905, foots up the total of 473. There have been 36 received into our midst during the year just ended, and we have lost, by death, the unusually small number of three.

The remainder of the morning session was taken up with the business of the Society and the reading of historical papers.

AFTERNOON.

The reading of historical papers was continued during the fore part of the afternoon, followed by a most interesting trip over the Mt. Penn Gravity Road with its unsurpassed scenic beauty.

EVENING.

In the early part of the evening the members of the Society were favored with a most interesting talk, by Daniel Miller, Esq., of Reading, Pa., on Historic Berks County, which was profusely illustrated by lantern slides, after which they adjourned to the Rajah Temple, on Franklin Street, for the reception and banquet.

The attendance was very large at the banquet, where the Society was treated to an excellent menu and unusually fine music by the celebrated Germania Orchestra, of Reading, Pa. The closing intellectual feast was an event long to be remembered. Jacob H. Redsecker, Ph.M., of Lebanon, Pa., presided as toastmaster, and the following gentlemen very ably responded to their several toasts: "The Pennsylvania-German Governors," Hon. Samuel W. Pennypacker, LL.D., Governor of Pennsylvania; "An Instance of Pennsylvania-German Patriotism," Hon. Irving P. Wanger, M.C.; "Our Pennsylvania-German Wives and Sweethearts," Professor George T. Ettinger, Ph.D.; "Our 'Dutch' Friends in South Africa," Frederick W. Unger; "The Pennsylvania-German in Contemporary Fiction," Reginald Wright Kauffman.

In Memoriam

Richard Meily.

Richard Meily died suddenly, at his home in Lebanon, Pa., at 1:30 P. M., on March 31, 1906. He was born in Jonestown, Pa., on December 8, 1839, the son of Henry Meily and Susan Flickinger.

Mr. Meily was one of the leading iron-masters of the Lebanon Valley. About 1857 he went to Lebanon, where he secured a clerical position in the Valley National Bank. In 1867, with his cousin John Meily as senior partner, he built the Meily furnace at Lebanon, which he rebuilt a year ago, and which, at the time of his decease, he was managing under the title of the Lebanon Valley Furnace Company.

Besides his connection with the furnace he was a director of the Lebanon Manufacturing Company, in the Jonestown Insurance Company, and was also interested in banking institutions.

His father, Henry Meily, was a leading business man of Jonestown in his day. He is survived by his wife, née Anna DeHuff, and two children, George E. Meily, of Lebanon, Pa., and Mrs. Ned Riest, of Michigan, also by a sister, Mrs. U. Henry Heilman, of Jonestown, Pa. His two brothers, George F. Meily, late State Senator, and Henry Meily, are both deceased.

Mr. Meily was a consistent and active member of St. John's Reformed Church, of Lebanon, Pa., where he served for many years as elder, organist of the Sundayschool and Superintendent of its primary department.

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He was one of the old school of self-reliant, self-made men. Business integrity, a personal regard for those subordinate to him and for their welfare, with a high sense of honor, caused him to be greatly esteemed by all who chanced to be thrown in contact with him.

He was elected to membership in the Pennsylvania-German Society on October 21, 1903.

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John Weidman Mish.

John Weidman Mish was born April 22, 1822, in Lebanon, Pa. He was son of John Bickel Mish, b. January 12, 1791, d. December 15, 1837, a practising physician of Lebanon, Pa.; studied medicine under the distinguished Dr. Samuel Agnew, and, for a while, in the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania; m. in 1816, to Maria Weidman, b. 1793, d. 1866, dau. Capt. John Weidman, of the Revolutionary War.

His grandfather, Jacob Mish, of Harrisburg, Pa., m. Catharine, dau. John Bickel, who was born 1748, in Switzerland, d. 1840, at Jonestown, Pa., and served during the Revolution as a member of Capt. Koppenheffer's company, Col. Timothy Green's battalion.

His great-grandfather, John Mish, b. September 8, 1729, d. January 20, 1810, m. Margaret Swake, b. September 28, 1838, both buried in Friedler's Church graveyard, near Shiremanstown, Cumberland County, Pa.

Mr. Mish was educated in the old Lebanon Academy. In his eighteenth year he began teaching school in Union Township, Lebanon County, and in 1841 became Principal of the Annville Academy, where he taught one year. Having read law with his uncle, Jacob B. Weidman, he was admitted to the Bar in 1845, practised his profession for several years and served for three years as District Attorney, the first man elected to that office under the new constitution. He then gave up the practise of law and became interested in the buying and selling of real estate, proving himself to be a successful business man.



He was Secretary and Treasurer of the Lebanon Gas Company from its organization in 1856; Director of the Lebanon National Bank; President of the Dime Savings Bank of Lebanon for three years; Cashier of the First National Bank of Lebanon for ten years; Treasurer of the borough of Lebanon; President of the Lebanon Cemetery Company for twenty years, and served two terms in the City Council. He was the oldest Free Mason in Lebanon County, also a member of the I. O. O. F.

In 1848 Mr. Mish was married to Amelia Krause, b. 1826, d. 1896, leaving five children—Matilda K., wife of Charles H. Killinger, of Lebanon; Mason P., of Lebanon; William W., of South Lebanon Township; Robert C., of Los Angeles, Cal.; and John, of Lebanon.

He became a member of the Pennsylvania-German Society at its organization. His decease occurred on June 14, 1906.




William Franklin Weiser.

William Franklin Weiser was born in York, Pa., on August 25, 1853. He was son of Erastus H. Weiser, January 28, 1826-July 11, 1872, and Anne Franklin, d. April 16, 1871 (dau. of Walter S. Franklin, and sister of late General B. Franklin, of York, Admiral Samuel R. Franklin, of Washington, and Colonel W. S. Franklin, of Baltimore), who was son of Charles Weiser, December 29, 1796-July 17,1867, son of Samuel Weiser, May 16, 1765-January 17, 1838, son of John Weiser, b. 1726, son of Christopher Frederick Weiser (bro. of Colonel Conrad Weiser), son of John Conrad Weiser, 1660-1746, leader of the German immigration to New York Province, and Captain, June-July, 1711, in the German contingent of the British Army assembled at Albany for attack on Montreal, son of Jacob Weiser, b. ab. 1625, "Schuldheisz " of Gross-Aspach, Germany, son of Jacob Weiser, b. ab. 1590, Chief Magistrate of Gross-Aspach.

Mr. Weiser was formerly of the banking house of Weiser, Son and Carl. He was a bachelor and had been retired for several years. Most of his time was passed as a tourist.

His death, owing to heart failure, occurred suddenly on the night of April 1, 1906, in his apartments at York, Pa.

He became a member of the Pennsylvania-German Society on April 11, 1894.



Robert Rau.

Robert Rau was born in Lehigh County, Pa., on November 4, 1844. He was son of David Rau, b. January 1, 1820, d. January 13, 1879, son of Valentine Rau, m. Elizabeth Fenner, who was dau. Felix Fenner, m. Martha Eschenbach, dau. Andrew Eschenbach, b. June 10, 1710, in Naumburg, Saxony, d. June 7, 1763, at Oley, Pa. He was one of the Moravian pioneers to Pennsylvania, in 1740, and established the Moravian Church at Oley, Pa.

His mother was Sarah A. Yundt, b. March 11, 1818, dau. Anna Mickley, b. March 12, 1794, d. 1888, dau. Jacob Mickley, son John Jacob Mickley (Jean Jacques Michelet), who came to America from Metz, August 28, 1733, and settled in Whitehall, Lehigh County, Pa. His parents were French Huguenots who fled from Metz and sought safety at Deux-ponts (Zwei-brücken). Jules Michelet (the historian), and the late Dr. Prof. Michelet, of the University of Berlin, are descendants.

Mr. Rau was educated at the Moravian Parochial School, of Bethlehem, and at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy, from which he graduated in 1866. At the time of his decease he was the senior member of the drug firm of Simon Rau & Company, Bethlehem.


He was actively identified with all the work of the Moravian Church. He became a member of the famous trombone choir at Bethlehem in 1866, and played in it for forty-five years; for forty years he was tenor soloist

of the choir; he was the Archivist of the Moravian Church, and a member of its Board of Church Extension.

Mr. Rau was author of a "History of the Water Works of Bethlehem" (the first in the United States), also of a "Sketch of the Moravian Congregation at Gnadenhütten, Pa."

He was a member of the Moravian Historical Society, and of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania. He was elected to membership in the Pennsylvania-German Society on July 20, 1894.

His death occurred suddenly, on July 30, 1906, and was due to heart disease. He is survived by one son, Albert G. Rau, Superintendent of the Moravian Parochial Schools.



Rudolph F. Kelker.

Rudolph F. Kelker, son of Frederick Kelker and Sarah Fager, was born in Harrisburg on February 17, 1820. He received a fair education, and spent the whole of his long life in that city.

In 1835, when a mere lad, he entered the hardware store of Ogelsby and Hinckley, which had been founded by his father. In 1842 he purchased the interest of Mr. Hinckley, and, when Mr. Ogelsby died in 1846, took full charge of the business, under the name of Kelker and Bros. He retired about 1851.

In 1852 he succeeded his father as a director of the Harrisburg Bank, serving for a number of triennial terms. For several years he was a director of the First National Bank, and a manager of the Harrisburg Cemetery.

Upon the incorporation of the city he was appointed, by the Legislature, on a commission to lay out the streets in the new territory included within its limits. From 1854 until 1891 he served as a trustee of the Harrisburg Academy, and was, for a long time, its Secretary and Treasurer.

From 1866 to 1872 Mr. Kelker was one of the directors of the poor for Dauphin County, and was instrumental in securing new buildings and other improvements. He was a founder of the City Hospital, and a manager from its organization in 1873 until 1889. In 1873 and 1874 he was one of the trustees of the Pennsylvania Lunatic Asylum at Harrisburg. At the organization of the

Harrisburg City Passenger Railway Company, in 1874, he was made a director, and was treasurer for nearly twenty years, but resigned and withdrew from the company when it was decided to run the cars on Sunday.

He was especially active in his church work, as a member of the Reformed Church, and held many offices in connection with its Sunday-school operations, its mission and other work. He was also an earnest advocate of the cause of temperance.

He died, universally respected and lamented, on Wednesday afternoon, October 3, 1906, survived by his two sons, Luther R. Kelker, Chief of the State Division of Public Records, and William A. Kelker.

Mr. Kelker became a member of the Pennsylvania-German Society on January 13, 1892.



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John Randolph Bricker.

John Randolph Bricker was born July 14, 1841, near Lititz, Pa., son of David Bricker, son of Peter, son of Christian, son of Peter Bricker, a Mennonite who emigrated from Switzerland, in 1733, and settled in Cocalico Township of Lancaster County, Pa. His mother was Lucinda A. Peterson, daughter of John Peterson, a Danish Moravian who emigrated to Lititz about 1795. He was married to Rachel Ricksecker, daughter of Jacob Ricksecker, a son of Peter Ricksecker, who emigrated to Mount Joy Township from Berne, Switzerland, in 1740.

Mr. Bricker's uncle, John Bricker, was a millwright by trade, and built the first mill to go by water in Texas, having emigrated to that Mexican province with Austin; later he was killed in the war with Mexico which led to the independence of Texas.

His grandmother was Eva Magdalena Holstein, daughter of George Holstein, of Millbach, Lebanon County, who served in Captain Hudson's company during the Revolution. His brother, Michael, who afterwards changed his name to Stoner, was a companion of Daniel Boone, and at one time, the only white man in Kentucky. He took part in the battle of King's Mountain, the capture of Vincennes, and was wounded at the siege of Boone's Fort and the massacre of Blue Licks.

He was educated at the Lititz Academy, and commissioned Captain of Company F, 179th P. V., in November, 1862. After being mustered out he was ap. . . .

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pointed a Commissioner of Subsistence by President Lincoln, with the rank of Captain, and later, Brevet Major.


Prior to the Civil War he was in the mercantile business, then, for a time, in the lumber business at Middletown, and, later, in the lumber trade in Kentucky. Afterward, he was engaged in the manufacture of cigars at Lititz, growing much of his own tobacco.

He was an active member of the Moravian Church, and connected with various of its operations. He became a member of the Pennsylvania-German Society at its organization.

His death occurred at 6:00 A. M., on Monday, October 15, 1906.

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Jacob B. Mauser.

Jacob B. Mauser was born June 14, 1837, in Northampton County, Pa., son of George Adam Mauser, b. July 18, 1798, d. August 17, 1883, and Maria Werner, b. June 5, 1806, d. November 11, 1876 (dau. Adam Werner and Eve Beidler), son of John Mauser.


Four years of his early life, from 1856 to 1860, were spent in Kansas. Returning to his native county he became actively identified with its industrial and financial doings. He was president of the Mauser Milling Company, operating the three largest flour mills in the Lehigh Valley, and a director of the State Millers' Association. He was, likewise, a director of the National Bank of Catasauqua, and a founder, director, and first vice-president of the Citizens' Deposit and Trust Company of Allentown. Mr. Mauser was said to have borne a striking resemblance to Vice-President Fairbanks.

His death occurred in Allentown, at 4:20 A. M., on Friday, December 28, 1906, from a hardening of the blood vessels. Besides his wife, he was survived by the following children:

Elsie, wife of Dr. Horace F. Livingood, of Womelsdorf, Pa., County Controller of Berks; J. Mark, of Treichlers, Northampton County; Stella M. and George B., both of Allentown.

He became a member of the Pennsylvania-German Society on October 25, 1900.

Rev. Franklin F. J. Schantz, D.U.

Rev. Franklin F. J. Schantz, D.D., was born January 8, 1836, in the home of his parents at the head of Cedar Creek, Upper Macungie township, Lehigh Co., Pa., and was baptized in his infancy by Rev. Daniel Zeller. He was son of Jacob Schantz, b. Nov. 28, 1791, d. June, 1843, a miller who, like his father, owned and operated the mill at the head of Cedar Creek, in Lehigh County, and was married to Sarah Fogel, b. July 25, 1799, d. April 25, 1871, dau. of Hon. John and Catherine (Stettler) Fogel, of Fogelsville, Pa. He was son of Jacob Schantz, b. 1761, m. 1788, Maria Bortz, who served as a frontier ranger in the Revolutionary War, and came to Pennsylvania as a Redemptioner, making his home with a farmer and miller, named Kohler, in Egypt, Northampton (now Lehigh) Co., where he learned the milling business. He was son of Johan Schantz, who arrived in Pennsylvania, October 1, 1770, accompanied by his four sons.

In his youth Dr. Schantz was instructed in St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church at Allentown, Pa., where he was confirmed Oct. 26, 1851, by Rev. Joshua Yeager. His early education was in the public and private schools of the neighborhood, followed by an attendance at the Allentown Academy from April 1848 to 1850, and then at the Allentown Seminary until the fall of 1853 when he entered the Junior class of Franklin and Marshall College

at Lancaster, graduating from the same in 1855, and from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg on Sept. 15, 1857. Thus equipped he was licensed as an Evangelical Lutheran minister at the meeting of the West Pennsylvania Synod at Carlisle, Pa., on Sept. 28, 1857, and ordained at the meeting of the Ministerium of Pennsylvania, in St. John's Church, Easton, Pa., on June 3, 1858.

On April 29, 1858, he was united in marriage to Miss Cordelia S. Saeger, dau. of Charles and Eliza (Eckert) Saeger, of Allentown. Three of their children survive: Henry F., a practising physician in Reading, Mrs. John P. Spangler, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. W. Stanton Haak of Lebanon.

From October, 1857, to January, 1861, Dr. Schantz had charge of Trinity Church, Reading; of the Catasauqua parish from 1861 to 1866; assistant agent Theological Seminary, Philadelphia, Nov. 5, 1865, to Sept. 30, 1866, then general agent until June 30, 1867. In July, 1867, he became pastor of the Myerstown Church, and retained this charge until his decease. He also served the Mount Aetna congregation, Zion's Church at Jonestown from July, 1867, to Dec., 1881, and Emanuel Church at Brickerville, Lancaster Co., from 1876 to 1879.

His labors in the service of his Master have been indefatigable. Besides the service of his own congregations, he was called to the offices of secretary and president of conferences, member and secretary of the synodical executive committee, secretary of the Ministerium, trustee of the Orphans' Home at Germantown, trustee of Muhlenberg College, visitor of the Emaus Orphans' Home, delegate to the General Council and member of the English Home Mission Board. The degree of Doctor of Divi-



nity was conferred upon him by Augustana College and Theological Seminary, at Rock Island, Ill., in 1894. At a meeting of the Evangelical Lutheran Ministerium of Pennsylvania, in Allentown, in May, 1901, he was made president of that great body, and reelected to the same office, May, 1902, and June, 1903.

Dr. Schantz took great interest in historical research. His brain was a veritable storehouse of such data, from which treasures, great and small, were constantly produced for the enlightenment of his hearers, and to their great enjoyment. He made scores of addresses on his favorite subject and wrote a number of most interesting and valuable articles, prominent amongst which are the following: "The Sesqui-Centennial Discourse, Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church near Stouchsburg, Pa.," 1893; "The Sesqui-Centennial Sermon, Jordan Evangelical Lutheran Church, Lehigh Co., Pa.," 1894; "Historical Discourse, 155th Anniversary of Jerusalem Church, Salisbury township, Lehigh Co., Pa.," 1896; "Historical Address Centennial of Third Church Building of Christ German Lutheran Congregation, Rockland township, Berks Co., Pa.," 1898; "History of Brickerville Congregation, Lancaster Co., Pa.," 1898; "Semi-Centennial of Muhlenberg College," 1898; "Domestic Life and Characteristics of the Pennsylvania-German Pioneer," in Vol. 10 of the Proceedings of the Pennsylvania-German Society.

Because of his active interest in matters pertaining to history it was but natural that he should be one of the founders of the Pennsylvania-German Society. His efforts to advance its great work were untiring. He was elected a member of its Executive Committee Oct., 1896, on which he served, most faithfully, until his elevation to

the Presidency in C., 1899. His familiar and genial face was rarely about from any meeting of the Society. It will be greatly n ed now that he has been called to his everlasting rewal.

His death occurre suddenly, at 10:45 P. M. on Saturday, January 19, 107, from failure of the heart, in his Myerstown parsona

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
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CHAPTER I.

THE WRECK OF THE "NEW ERA." 1




THE story of the early German Emigration to Pennsylvania and adjacent States, forms one of the most interesting chapters of our local history. Happily without any record of such great disaster to an individual vessel as occurred in a later period which we intend to recall in the

present instance, especially appropriate as the time indicates the half century mark since the people of this and neighboring States were horrified with the gruesome details attending a great marine tragedy upon our shores, so near to our own homes, and within the recollection of the writer and some of the older members of the Pennsylvania-German Society.

Much has been written of the sufferings and privations endured during the provincial and colonial periods by the Palatines as they were commonly called, during the ocean voyage to America; which in those times, and prior to

the advent of the clipper ship often lasted from four to twenty-four weeks. Caspar Wistar in a published letter dated December 4, 1732, mentions a case of the latter kind where on account of lack of food they caught rats and mice on the ship, and a mouse was sold for as high as 30 farthings. To such trials we must add the brutality of the seamen, the rascality of the captains of that day, together with the deceptions practiced upon the German emigrant by the so-called newlanders or promoters of these emigrations. The ravages of ship fever and escapes from pirates have been successively set forth in our publications.

Yet all of these stories lose their horror when compared with the wreck of the "New Era" and the criminal heartlessness of the captain and his crew.

Fortunately the story of German emigration to America is remarkably free from stories of shipwreck attendant with any great loss of life. This is especially true during the early days of our history. The writer knows of no specific case where any German emigrant ship was wrecked with so fatal results upon our shores during the colonial period or the subsequent half century as that of the "New Era" upon Deal Beach on the morning of November 13, 1854, then a sparsely settled stretch of desolate, bleak and dangerous sandy coast of New Jersey. The scene of this tragedy is now known as the flourishing summer resort Asbury Park. The summer visitor who joins in the gay throng on the boardwalk when near Seventh Avenue will see a square plinth of granite. A shaft that formerly surmounted it, about 12 feet high, was washed away during a storm some years ago and was lost in the quicksand of the shore. This memorial marks the spot opposite to where the wreck took place and the



ribs of the vessel are now embedded in the shifting quicksand some rods from shore, leaving nothing visible to indicate the tragedy of that November day fifty years ago.

The night of Sunday, November 12, 1854, was a dark and stormy one, the moon had just entered into the last quarter, and a cold rain set in with high winds. Deal Beach on the Jersey shore, at all times a bleak, desolate and dangerous part of the Atlantic coast, strewn as it is by no less than forty-four wrecks during the past century, was particularly so upon the night in question, deserted by its sparse residents, then consisting of but few families, the most prominent of whom were the Allens, Whites, Corlies and Slocums, who eked out an existence on this barren shore by fishing and farming. The Allens at that time were the only ones who added to their income by taking summer boarders.

No regular United States life saving service had been established there half a century ago. A volunteer station, however, was kept up from 1848 to 1857 just above Great Pond, now Deal Lake, by Abner Allen. This was equipped with a surf boat and mortar for throwing a rocket line, but was without either any regular beach patrol or lookout.

During this eventful winter night the storm increased toward morning, when to add to the terrors of the coming morn the sharp clanging of a ship's bell was suddenly heard to mingle its sound with that of the howling elements. The scattered residents knew but too well what these sounds meant, and almost before the men could don their oilskins and sou-westers and reach the beach shrieks of hundreds of despairing men and women reached their ears.


Arriving at the beach the people were startled to see,

through the misty fog and driving rain, the dim outlines of a large square rigged ship hard and fast upon the outer bar with all sails set, about five hundred yards from the shore. This was about six o'clock. About the break of day, a big set of seas lifted the vessel off the outer bar, and threw her fair upon the beach about 150 to 200 yards from shore. This was opposite where the base of the monument is seen at the end of Seventh Avenue at Asbury Park. The wind when the vessel struck was S.W. but soon veered around to S.E. The current of the sea setting north, turned the vessel broadside to the shore, her head to the south at a place noted for its shifting quicksands, and supposed to be the subterranean outlet for the body of water now known as Sunset Lake.


The sea running very high broke over the vessel as high as the first yard arm, and in less than an hour she filled and sank, the roughness of the surf resisting every attempt of the heroic volunteer surfmen to launch their life boat and reach the fated vessel.

As the day broke and the fog lightened a wierd sight met the people upon the shore. The deck and rigging of the vessel, which proved to be the clipper ship "New Era" from Bremen to New York, were filled with almost five hundred souls—German emigrants from the Fatherland to the New World.

The news of the wreck was quickly spread along the coast from Long Branch to Squaw, and for a considerable distance inland, and brought to the shore crowds of men, women and children, who hurried to the scene of the wreck in vehicles of all kinds from far and near, some to aid and assist in the work of rescue, among whom were two local physicians, some from idle or morbid curiosity, others again to capture such of the flotsam and jetsam as might be cast ashore.




EDWARD WARDELL AT HIS HOME. BASE OF THE BRADLEY MONUMENT.

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The Wreck of the "New Era."

The volunteer life saving crew was quickly at the scene of the wreck with life boat, mortar and rocket line. Attempts were made at once to launch the lifeboat under the direction of Britton White and John Slocum, two of the most experienced surfmen on that part of the Jersey coast, but as before stated owing to the wildness of the surf every effort proved futile.

To make matters worse, as the wind shifted, it swung around the spankerboom and swept into the sea from eighty to a hundred of the unfortunate emigrants who had gathered in the lee of the boom. Several eye-witnesses of this tragedy told the writer that the sea around the after part of the vessel was black with the heads of the unfortunate Germans, in fact, to use the expression of an old lady, wife of a leading practitioner in Asbury, who was present when a child, "the sea looked as if a great flock of ducks had settled around the vessel."

In the meantime, while these efforts were made on shore a boat was lowered and cleared away from the ship. This was manned by the first and second officers and three of the crew who started for the beach with orders to get a line ashore through the wild breakers. The crew of the boat, however, cast off the line, abandoned the ship and rowed ashore. Another boat was lowered, but hardly had it cleared the ship when the cowards who manned it cut the line and saved themselves. The sailors heartlessly turned their backs on the wailing passengers. The last remaining boat, known as the "long boat" and intended to hold from 40 to 50 persons was then lowered over the lee side and six of the crew got in to bail her out. While thus occupied the ship's surgeon, a doctor Papensuysen, who had gathered up such gold and silver coin belonging to the passengers as was placed in his charge,

attempted to get into the boat. Weighted down as he was with his ill-gotten money, his weight capsized the boat and he was crushed between boat and ship, and was swallowed up by the sea, never to be found.

Hour after hour the desperate multitude shouted and raved, while the life savers on shore tried to shoot a line across the wreck from a mortar. Many of the shots were wild and several times the wire connected with the ball broke. But every time the mortar flashed the trembling passengers alternately cheered and groaned. About noon one of the shots carried the line straight. It went across the fore royal stay, and was caught by a man on the end of the flying gib boom. The Captain made it fast by the fore stay, and all hands helped to haul the life boat from the shore to the ship. The Captain got into the forechains, and was followed by a part of the remaining crew. The boat having capsized several times in being hauled to the ship was full of water, and the Captain ordered some of the crew to get in and bail her out. When this was done he jumped overboard and scrambled into the boat, leaving five of the crew aboard and as he got into the boat he cried out to the people to haul the boat ashore.

Ten or twelve of the passengers jumped after the Captain and attempted to get into the boat. They were, however, beaten back and all were drowned but four, who fought their way into the boat. The people on the beach now hauled the boat toward the shore, but she capsized three times in going, and only the Captain, three of the crew and one passenger who had clung to the keel of the boat, were saved.

On her way to the shore the line connecting the shore and ship parted and the hundreds of human beings upon

the ill-fated vessel were again abandoned and left in despair.

The life savers again fired lines to the doomed ship but all went astray. At last the powder was exhausted and but a single ball left, a call was then made among the people on the beach—and a number hurried to their homes for their powder horns. In a couple of hours enough rifle powder was gathered to try another shot which was the last one. This was successful so far as reaching the ship was concerned, but unfortunately the line caught on the foretopsail brace, far beyond the reach of any of the persons left aboard. By this time it was nearly dark, and the people on shore had exhausted their powder and shot, while the sea was running so high that nothing could be done with the boats. Thus almost four hundred despairing beings were left to what proved to be the death of the majority of their number.

The night was again a wild one. About eight o'clock in the evening a cold westerly wind set in, the blast which was piercing cold sweeping through the rigging and cordage with a dismal howl, while the pounding of the waves against the side of the doomed ship formed a deep bass. Yet more shrill than the sound of wind and wave, came the treble of the brazen ship's bell, whose iron tongue was kept in constant motion, seconded by the shrieks, groans and prayers of the half frozen and dying Germans who had been so ruthlessly abandoned by the Yankee captain and crew.

The people on shore, to cheer and encourage these poor people, built large fires of driftwood on the beach. These were kept up throughout the night to let the poor wretches know that they were not entirely deserted.

News of the disaster had also been telegraphed from

Long Branch to New York early in the eventful morning. This news was immediately conveyed to Captain Reynolds of the steamer "Achilles," a vessel employed by the underwriters to render assistance to vessels ashore, which was then lying off Sandy Hook. The captain in place of going at once to the scene of the wreck, asked advice from New York whether he should come up to the city for wrecking schooners. While thus losing valuable time another message was sent him that the lives of three hundred passengers were imperiled. Upon this advice Captain Reynolds decided to go at once to the scene of the wreck. Owing to the density of the fog and the rough sea it was not until eight o'clock in the evening that the steamboat hove to off Deal Beach. At that time the "New Era " was full of water and every swell was breaking in heavy surges across her decks, the rigging then being filled with human beings closely packed together clinging to each other, and to the ropes as the ship surged to and fro with each returning wave.

As the "Achilles," however, had neither life nor surfboats nor life preservers nothing could be done to render assistance to the dispairing Germans upon the wrecked vessel. The steamer, however, stood by, but was unable to approach near enough to be of material service. Unfortunately even communication could not be established as there was no one on the wreck who could understand English, and no one on the steamer who could speak German.

In the meantime another steamer, the "Leviathan," arrived from New York, but like the "Achilles" had neither apparatus nor means of rendering any assistance. Still later the tug "Hector" having a wrecking schooner in tow, hove into sight. No attempt, however, at rescue

was made and the "Achilles" and "Leviathan" returned to New York amidst the groans of the passengers. Thus the emigrants aboard the ill-fated ship were left to their fate, seemingly abandoned by the would-be rescuers on both land and sea.

Several persons who in their youth were present on the shore during this stormy night and assisted in keeping up the beacons during the night, told the writer that up to the present time they have not been able to forget the shrieks, cries and sounds of the poor people, and how they were gradually silenced as they either became numb from cold and exhaustion, or were washed into the raging sea.

However, before the break of day on the fourteenth, the ship was boarded from shore, and one hundred and thirty-five passengers, most if not all men, were safely landed, three of whom died shortly after reaching shore. This little party was all that was left alive out of the four hundred and ten aboard when the ship struck.

The rescue was brought about in the following manner: By four o'clock in the morning the sea had gone down sufficiently to enable surfboats to live. It was half past four o'clock when Edward Wardell, the wreck master of the underwriters and general agent of the American Coast Wrecking Company, gave orders to launch the surfboats. Jumping into the first boat, manned by a crew under Britton White and John Slocum, the wreck was soon reached, and Wardell was the first man to set his foot upon the deck. Two other boats followed, and at the command and under the direction of the wreck master the work of rescue was at once commenced, and was so well carried out that within two and one half hours all of the living were safely landed after having been buffeted by the


waves and elements for no less than twenty-six hours without food or drink. The rescue was achieved, notwithstanding the heavy rolling surf and the sea constantly breaking over the wreck.

Too much credit cannot be given to Wreckmaster Edward Wardell, for his efforts to save what remained alive of these poor German emigrants. The writer is glad to say that this noble hero at the present writing is still alive, living in the old homestead on the Shrewsbury river, hale and hearty with hair and beard as white as snow, a typical Jersey surfman of the olden time. His bright eyes glistened as he recounted the story of the "New Era" to the writer during the past summer, not the least interesting part being the story of how he stopped pilfering and the taking of valuables from the dead.

The bodies as they were washed ashore were gathered and taken to the ten pin alley at Allen's boarding house until an inquest could be held by the Coroner. As they could not be identified they were merely numbered and a description taken by that official. After this was done each body was placed in a rough wooden box (for which the Coroner charged the county seven dollars) and buried in a common grave in the little Methodist burial ground between Long Branch and Eatontown.

In after years an organization was formed by the Germans living at Long Branch. Red Bank, and adjacent villages, having for its object the erection of a suitable monument over this common grave. Their efforts proved successful and a fine granite shaft was set up and dedicated with appropriate ceremony on November 13, 1892. This quiet spot was visited by the writer during the past summer and was found to be in good order and the mound

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was decorated with a number of small German and American flags. This monument organization is now continued as a beneficial society and has a large local membership.

In conclusion the writer will say that in running out the story of the "New Era" after the lapse of fifty years, he has interviewed a number of people who were present at the time of the wreck, necessitating the travel of many miles with attendant expense and loss of time. The official accounts of the day have also been obtained, which, together with a detailed statement from one of the crew and of two survivors, are incorporated in this paper to make the record complete.

In interviewing these different people, numerous interesting incidents were met with. It was found that among the survivors were two brothers, one of whom remained in New Jersey, the other drifted to Virginia. The former served three years in the Union army, while his brother served the same term on the Confederate side during the Civil War. Another survivor drifted to Chicago, became well to do, but lost his all in the great fire, but with German pluck and perseverance recovered, and is said to be again wealthy. All three of the above have since visited the scene of the wreck and rescue.

In another instance a woman was found wearing the ear-rings taken from the ears of one of the half-dead women cast upon the shore. Another family secured cloth enough from the wreck to clothe their men and boys for more than a quarter of a century. The story of how this large bolt of cloth was gotten is thus: A large German feather bed was cast up on shore. The wrecker hauling it on the beach felt something large and hard inside and when the ticking was cut open, the attempt to beat Uncle Sam's custom authorities was revealed. After



this find every mattress and feather bed coming ashore was cut open.

There are still many traditions current in the neighborhood of money belts and valuables taken from the bodies by different persons who scoured the beach for days after the wreck. But little definite of such facts could be found at the present day.

There was but one woman saved of those swept into the sea. She was cast upon the shore, about where the Asbury Park Casino now stands. The lifeless body of her husband was cast up at her feet. The woman who proved to be a passenger for Philadelphia, showing signs of life, was taken to a nearby house, and within two hours gave birth to a son.

Perhaps the most amusing incident in the writer's search after actual survivors, to get them to recall their gruesome experience was in the case of an old German woman back of Eatontown, to whom he was referred as one of the rescued number. After considerable trouble she was located and found, and while the interview was not entirely what was expected, it threw a gleam of comedy amidst the mass of tragic detail collected from other sources. This is what happened:

Finding that she was the woman to whom I was referred, I told her in a few words that I was looking up some survivors of the ill-starred "New Era" to get their story and that I was referred to her as one of the fortunate ones. Her reply was characteristic:

"Ach du lieber Gott! Dass vas so."

"Well kindly tell me now how you came to be saved?"

"Ach! das vas a derible time-mehr als tree hundert arme deutsche vos trounted, de Kaptain vas trunk und runs de ship on de shore to gets de insurance und kills de

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passengers for der money und den he runs avay. Ach! du lieber Gott, es vas gräslich I never fergets it so long I lives."

"Well, my dear woman, how were you saved?"

"Vell as I tells you how it vas, I vas one of dem few womans vot vas not trounted. Ven I vas at Bremerhaven I gets sick und der toctor who vas a pig ret faced Dutchman vould not let me kum on der ship he say I going to die—so I tont go und koms over mit der next ship."

The "New Era" was a new ship of 1,328 tons, having been built at Bath, Maine, by Hitchcock & Company, during the previous fall and winter, and was launched in April. The vessel was upon her first voyage when she went ashore. Her owners were the builders, Hitchcock & Company, and the Captain, Thomas J. Henry.

She sailed from Bremen on September 28, 1854, for the port of New York, with a cargo of six hundred tons of chalk, about twenty thousand cubic feet of general merchandise, and a passenger list of five cabin passenger, six in second cabin and three hundred and seventy-four in the steerage. The crew consisted of 29 persons and twelve passengers' cooks, making a grand total including the Captain of no less than 427 souls.

The "New Era" was consigned to the firm of Charles C. Duncan & Co., of No. 52 South Street, New York City. She was commanded by Captain Thomas J. Henry, a part owner. The vessel was heavily insured, viz., \$10,000 in the Mutual Insurance Company, of Bath, Me., \$50,000 divided among six Boston companies, \$25,000 in other Bath companies, and \$6,000 in Wall Street, New York. Owing to this heavy insurance it was publicly stated at the time that the ship was intentionally run



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
ashore to get the insurance which it was believed was far above the real value of vessel and cargo.


The whole voyage, however, was an unlucky one; during the first few weeks the voyage was an uneventful one. It was no better nor worse than the average trip on a sailing vessel of that kind, where so many people were huddled together for weeks in the smallest possible space without proper food, ventilation or sanitation. As a result, when well out upon the ocean the cholera broke out among passengers and crew. The nature of the plague was kept quiet to prevent a panic. Forty-six, however, died and were buried during the night. To make matters worse during the latter part of October the ship encountered heavy gales, and shipped a sea which swept away the cook's galley, caused great damage and killed several passengers beside straining the vessel to such an extent that she sprang a leak, necessitating constant labor at the pumps.

On Sunday morning, November 12th, she ran into a fog, and a gale started up in the morning which grew into a storm. The ship began to roll heavily and refused to obey her helm, and finally drifted ashore early on the next morning, with the tragic results here chronicled.

The place where the vessel struck on the Jersey shore was between Deal and Long Branch, about fifteen miles below Sandy Hook and nearly thirty-five miles from New York. The sandy beach at that time was exceedingly bleak, and at that time of the year very dangerous. Shrewsbury Inlet was on one side of the vessel and the rugged beach of Squam on the other.

The probable cause of the disaster was a subject which engaged the conversation of all who were present at the beach. It was attributed by many to official neglect of

duty. First, it is stated among the passengers that neither the captain nor the mate was upon deck at the time the vessel struck, that the captain was in his cabin asleep, it being the mate's watch, and that the latter had forsaken his post, and had been below for some time.

The scene of the wreck of the "New Era" at the time of the disaster was one of desolation. The coast was a wilderness of sand dunes and scrub pines. Less than a score of families lived along the shore from Elbernon down to the banks of Shark river, all was an unbroken solitude. Now after the lapse of half a century this same stretch of bleak coast has been transformed into a continuous line of pleasure resorts, with buildings and improvements representing an outlay of millions of dollars, and boasts of a population of thousands.

The immediate place of the wreck is now known as Asbury Park. James A. Bradley, the founder of this operation, erected a neat monument beside the boardwalk to commemorate the tragedy enacted here. This memorial was an ornate granite shaft, about twelve feet high surrounded by a light iron railing, and the anchor chains of the ill-fated "New Era." When erected a frame with the following inscription was temporarily attached to the shaft:

"NEAR THIS SPOT THE LARGE PACKET SHIP 'NEW ERA' WAS WRECKED IN 1854. OVER THREE HUN-DRED PERSONS LOST THEIR LIVES. THIS MONUMENT IS ERECTED TO COMMEMORATE THE ZEAL AND ENERGY OF GOVERNOR WM. I. NEWELL OF NEW JERSEY. AS CON-GRESSMAN HE SUCCEEDED IN GETTING A LAW PASSED ESTABLISHING THE UNITED STATES LIFE SAVING SER-VICE, AND ALSO TO COMMEMORATE THE FIDELITY OF THE





LIFE SAVING CREWS, WHOSE EFFICIENCY RENDERS SUCH A DISASTER AT THIS DAY ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE. THE MONUMENT WILL BE SUITABLY INSCRIBED LATER."

During a severe storm the shaft was washed into the sea and settling down into the quicksands, same as the old wreck, it was never recovered. The picture here shown is unique, being an enlargement of a hand camera snapshot made by Professor Kain, of Philadelphia. The base of the memorial is still seen, a silent reminder of the tragedy, to the gav throngs that now crowd the board walk during the season. Mention has been made of the "New Era" Association. This organization was formed April 5, 1891. Its object was to raise funds to erect a monument in the West Long Branch cemetery, where the victims of the wreck were buried. The organizers of the association were John V. Kolb, of Long Branch, president; Henry Schoenlein, of Long Branch, secretary; G. P. Kuhl, of Red Bank, treasurer; Lewis Jacobson and Charles Gremer, of Long Branch, and William Howell, of Red Bank.

As a result of the labors of the association a monument costing over \$700 was erected and was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies November 20, 1892. The plot was enclosed and has since been cared for by the association. Until the association was organized only a wooden slab marked the spot where the victims were buried.

The "New Era" Association gradually became a benevolent association, with branches at Long Branch, Red Bank and Keyport, and at the present writing is a flourishing organization.





CHAPTER II.


CONTEMPORANEOUS ACCOUNTS OF THE GREAT DISASTER.



HE first news of the disaster to reach Long Branch was about eight o'clock on Monday morning, November 13. This was immediately conveyed to Captain Reynolds of the "Achilles," who was then lying off Sandy Hook. While waiting an answer from W. R. Jones, as to whether he should go at once to the wreck, or go

to the city for the wrecking schooners, a message came from Mr. Morris, at Long Branch, that the ship ashore had three hundred passengers on board, and was fast breaking up. Upon this, Captain Reynolds decided to go at once to the scene of the wreck, and co-operate with those already on the spot in saving life. A correspondent of the New York *Herald*, who was aboard, says:

"We left the Hook at half past nine, in a dense fog



and southerly wind, which raised a very heavy head swell. The fog, however, so increased in density as to render it impossible to discern objects further than the vessel's length, much less to keep sight of the shore at a safe distance, or see objects near it. We, however, kept on, until we must have been within a short distance of where the wreck lay; but as it was impossible to see or do anything, Captain Reynolds after waiting some time, put the vessel's head again to the northward. When opposite the Highlands, the fog suddenly lighted up, so that the land could be distinctly seen, and we again steered to the southward in search of the wreck.

"About eight o'clock we came in sight of her, lying broadside to the beach, heading to the southward, with her fore, main and mizzen topsails close reefed still standing. On reaching her, she proved to be level with the water and full, and the swell breaking in heavy surges across her decks. We had already passed many pieces of the wreck, and half a mile further on we saw the body of a little child, apparently about four or five years old, and in quick succession also that of a man, stripped of clothing, and others with clothes on—four or five bodies in all. As we approached the wreck, so as to get a nearer view, a most harrowing spectacle met the eyes.

"The jib-boom, rigging and top of the ship, fore and aft, were filled with human beings closely packed together, and clinging to each other, and to the ropes while the ship surged to and fro with each returning wave, which broke into spray far into the rigging and over the ship, drenching and suffocating the passengers, while the poor creatures filled the air with the most soul-harrowing and pitiful outcries for assistance. On the beach were some two hundred persons, gathered in groups, apparently consult-



ing as to how to act, while others sat leisurely upon the gunwale of the boats, which the heavy surf rendered it certain destruction to launch.

"We saw several boats upon the shore, apparently well adapted for the purpose, and a crowd of persons dragging along a life-boat toward the beach, where it was left, and no further attempt was made to launch it.

"We saw no line from the ship to the shore, and no lifecar. From the fact that what appeared to be the ship's boat was lying on the beach, we judged that the officers and crew, or most of them, must have landed or been thrown ashore in her. The tide was now about at its full, the wind had died away, and a slight breeze sprang up from off shore, which greatly increased our hopes that the swell would go down with the tide, and render it possible for the boats to be launched from shore. As to ourselves, we found we could do nothing.

"The steamer, which is employed expressly by the underwriters to render assistance to vessels ashore, had not the sign of surf-boat on board, nothing but two miserable yawls, both of which would scarcely float the vessel's crew, were she sinking, and one of them could not float herself if put overboard.

"Not a spar, line or life-preserver—not a piece of cork big enough to float a drowning dog. By 4:30 o'clock the swell had so much subsided that every passenger could have been rescued had there been a surf-boat on board, and there was not a man, from the fireman to the pilot and captain, who would not have rejoiced at the opportunity of snatching the poor sufferers from death had they the means of doing it.

"By whose neglect is it that these steamboats are not provided with surf-boats for such dreadful emergencies as

this? Still hoping for a movement towards launching the boats from shore, we continued painful spectators of the scene, ringing our bell to encourage them, and beckoning to them on the shore to launch the boats. When our wheels were put in motion to adjust the position of the steamer, the passengers, apparently fearing we were about to leave them, would rend the air with imploring cries, while others tolled the ship's bell, the sounds of which were borne to us above the wailings of the surf that swept over the ship.


"We were near enough to distinctly see women holding their little ones with one hand, while the other, bleached by the spray, clung with a death grip to the ratlines on which they stood, only one or two in the mizzen rigging having on but a shirt. On the forecastle there stood a few moments ago a group of four clinging to the stay, but they are now gone—a heavy swell has probably swept them away. Men have been seen to fall from the jib-boom into the surf.

"Thus we have looked on, unable to approach the ship. Captain Reynolds twice hailed them on the shore, and asked them to launch the boats, as the surf, to us; seemed to be now sufficiently smooth to do so on the lee side of the ship. Finding that we could do nothing, and as the sun went down, seeing the boats hauled back upon the beach, we left to procure life boats, making signals to the wreck that we would return immediately. Meantime, the 'Leviathan' also arrived opposite the wreck, but like ourselves, had no boats to render any assistance.


"On our way up we soon met the 'Hector,' having in tow a wrecking schooner, in charge of Captain Bowne, and with him we went back to the wreck. On reaching it, Captain Bowne informed us that although he had boats,

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he had not two men who could pull an oar, and asking if any on board would go with him in the boat? I replied, 'Here is one,' and Mr. Haskell volunteered to do the same.

"Captain Reynolds then informed Captain Bowne that he could get men to man his life boat by coming alongside of the 'Achilles.' We then made preparations to join Captain Bowne, but to our surprise he pulled away from us toward the ship, leaving word for the 'Achilles' to return to the city.

"Thus a large and powerful boat, with plenty of accommodations for the rescued passengers, was sent to the town, and the 'Hector,' a comparatively slow and unsuitable boat, retained.

"At 8:30 o'clock, when we left the wreck, the wind was blowing fresh from the westward, and it was thought would soon reduce the swell, but with the darkness to contend with, and short handed, it must be impossible to take off the passengers, and many more must inevitably perish from exposure during the dreary darkness that has now closed over them."

The next account we have was written at seven o'clock on Monday evening, and gives the situation from the shore:

"The ship remains in the same position as before reported, broadside to the sea, which runs mountains high, and renders it impossible for the tug boats to render any assistance. The sea is breaking over the wreck, and before dark we could see every available space in the rigging filled with probably some two hundred persons. Not less, probably, than seventy-five have already been washed overboard, and from present indications a great many

more will be hurled into the sea before any effectual assistance can be rendered.

"All the balls at the station were shot over the ship without being able to send a line on board from the shore, except in one case, when a life boat was immediately sent out to the wreck, and Captain Henry and eight or ten others got into it; but it was instantly capsized and turned completely over twice. Captain Henry and four others clung to the boat and succeeded in reaching the shore. Unfortunately, at the time the life boat capsized, the cable from the shore to the ship gave way, and there was then no remedy but to send to another station and procure more balls for the purpose of throwing another line over the wreck, and not an instant was lost in sending to the nearest life-boat station for this purpose.

"The ship is a perfect wreck, and there is not the least hope of saving anything.

"Should the heavy sea continue during the night, it is scarcely possible that more than a very few of the passengers now on board or holding on to the rigging, can be saved, and it is not at all improbable that every soul will be washed overboard before daylight.

"All the passengers are Dutch or German, and as there is no one here who understands their language, we are not able to obtain from those who reached the shore any information in regard to the condition of things on board, which undoubtedly is bad enough."

[By eight o'clock the ship had settled in the quicksands and was nearly level with the sea, which was then making a clean breach over her, and it was not thought possible that the passengers could hold on much longer. A second line had been thrown from the shore across the deck of the ship, but the passengers and crew appear to have been too



much exhausted to avail themselves of it, and the general opinion was that the ship must go to pieces very speedily, and in that case probably every soul on board would be lost.]

By four o'clock on Tuesday morning, November 14th, the sea had gone down sufficiently to enable surf boats to live, and at 4:30 o'clock Mr. Wardell's boats went off to the wreck, and by seven o'clock one hundred and thirtyfive persons were safely landed, notwithstanding a heavy rolling surf and the sea almost constantly breaking over the ship.

After all the living were taken from the wreck, search was made on board for the dead. Twelve bodies were brought on shore, and it was understood that at least twenty or thirty more were still on board, many of whom were cut and mangled in the most shocking manner.

Most of those saved were forwarded to Red Bank the same afternoon, and reached New York City, by the steamer "Alice P. Price," on Wednesday evening.

Several of the women were so completely exhausted as to render it impossible to remove them at the time, but they were well taken care of.

The whole number landed by Captain Wardell and his crew was 153, several of whom, however, died from the effects of their terrible hardships during the following thirty-six hours.

A VISIT TO THE WRECK.

Another correspondent who saw the ship shortly after the passengers were rescued says:

"The vessel was wrecked about half a mile from the residence of Abner Allen, directly opposite his house. Making our way to the beach, we found Captain Bowne,



and Edward Wardle of the underwriters, Mr. Jacob Morris of the custom house, and a large number of people.

"The ship lay about 300 yards from the shore, on the outer bar, her deck level with the water, and the sea washing over her continually. At the period of which we write (four P. M., Tuesday) it was about low water. There is no chance of saving anything from her beyond her rigging. The masts were standing uninjured, and with the exception of the loss of mizzen-top-gallant, she appeared to have suffered no damage above the bulwarks. The fore, main, and mizzen topsails were still set, as when she went on, treble reefed. The other sails appeared to be loosely clewed up, and rent in many places. In the main shrouds, the body of a female was still visible, nearly nude, her arms and legs thrust through the cross-The planking of the bulwarks was all torn off, and ings. the sea belched every moment through the frame of the bulwarks, like the smoke from a frigate's guns when firing a broadside.

"Captain Bowne having kindly invited us to go on board with him, we took a seat in the surf-boat, and were soon rowed through the breakers and alongside the ship's Watching an opportunity, as a spent wave requarter. ceded, we leaped into the mizzen rigging. Such a spectacle as the decks of the 'New Era' then presented we hope never to be called to witness again. The forecastle was beaten in, and the top of the poop-cabin on the larboard side had a large hole in it that the waves had made. The deck had been swept of everything. The frames of the bulwarks stood above the waves, like the fleshless ribs of a leviathan, while protruding through them were the bodies of men, women and children, all of them naked, or but partially covered with the clothes they had on when asleep in their berths. But the most awful sight of all

was directly below our feet. There, between the side of the poop-cabin and the mizzen chains about a score of corpses, all stark, stiff and cold, lay in every conceivable attitude of agony, maimed, crushed and bruised, with eyes washed from their sockets, with teeth set like vices, and every feature fearfully convulsed; there, promiscuously heaped together, were old men whose race had nearly run; young maidens, just blooming into womanhood, and babes whose lives were measured but by weeks. Every age and sex had its representative here, and told in ghastly types how much humanity may suffer. The blood had frozen into blackness beneath their finger-nails, and with the half-clinched hand, showed how strong had been the grip upon the rigging-how long and fierce the strife for life; a contest in which they did not yield until the bleak blast had frozen their hearts' blood, and their unconscious hands had loosened their grasp, when their lives went out in the dark night, swallowed up beneath the seething waves that burst madly over the ship.

"We observed upon the front of the chemise of one of the women, the Roman capital letters 'W. K.' worked in red cotton, and upon another, the capitals 'E. R.'

"And let us here remark, that until we came on board, the sea had been so rough, and the tide too high to venture from the shore, else these remains of the poor strangers would have been taken ashore and prepared for interment. As it was, Captain Bowne ran along the top of the bulwarks to the main rigging, to take down the body of the woman that still remained there. With some difficulty he disentangled her stiffened limbs from the shrouds, and gently lowered her by a rope into the surf boat.

"The boat came alongside, and we leaped into her, thankful for our escape from the death-laden ship. Just then a few gulls wheeled and screamed about her, and the





waves beat a hollow bass to their treble; the sun as it was about to set, flooded the wreck with a halo of crimson and gold, and tinged even the gay barks that rode so bravely far out at sea, with its glory. A sudden jerk, and our boatmen were up to their waists in water, hauling the boat up upon the beach. And then the sun went down, and as the gay twilight came on, the people on the shore silently bore off the body of the young girl, that had so long lain stiffening in the rigging, that it might be prepared for Christian burial.

"On reaching Mrs. Allen's house, on our return from the beach, a number of wagons and carriages, containing farmers and their wives from the neighborhood, were drawn up near the door, and the good dames of Jersey were quietly dispensing their charity in the shape of clothes to the half naked men and women that gathered around them, and showered benedictions on their heads.

"Nearly all of the bodies that have been found as yet had gold wadded into some portion of their dress. Some of them possessed a considerable amount. The whole of it has been placed in the care of the coroner, who records the number and description of the body upon which it was found, and holds it in trust until the lawful owners shall claim it.

"Among the persons deserving of commendation for their untiring efforts for the safety of the passengers are Messrs. Jacob W. Morris and Edward Wardle of Long Branch, Captain Wilson of Squan, Captain Bowne of New York, as well as the other gentlemen whom we have particularized. Indeed, had the craven crew and paralyzed Captain of the 'New Era' but manifested such dauntless bravery as that displayed by the New Jersey coastmen, we should not have had to chronicle such dread results from this last disaster as we do this morning."





CHAPTER III.


STATEMENTS OF CAPTAIN AND CREW.



CAPTAIN Thomas J. Henry, commander of the "New Era" made the following statement:

"We left Bremen on the twenty-eighth of September, last, with three hundred and seventy-four steerage passengers, six second cabin and four cabin passengers on board. Our cargo consisted

of six hundred tons of chalk, and twenty thousand cubic feet of merchandise of various kinds. We had a very hard passage, with heavy west winds, and about the twentieth of October, we shipped a sea that swept everything from the decks. The sea struck us fore and aft, and stove in the bulwarks, swept off the passengers' cooking range, killed two or three passengers, and disabled several others. The water passed into the main hatchway. The passengers killed were of the steerage list. The gales continued



very heavy, and the sea being so strong it strained the vessel so that she commenced leaking, and when reaching the United States coast, she leaked very bad. The leak was so rapid that it was requisite to keep one pump in operation all the time, prior to arriving here. The last observation I had was 66 degrees longitude west, and 41 degrees, 50 minutes, latitude. This was last Friday; we have had no observation since.

"On Saturday it was thick, the rain falling heavily, and a strong breeze from the south. I then judged the ship to be in 72 degrees, 30 minutes, longitude and 40 degrees, 25 minutes, latitude. On that night we had the wind high from the eastward—changed to southeast about midnight, and commenced blowing very heavily.

"The cast of the lead was made every hour, and I supposed the ship to be on the Long Island coast, and we carried a heavy press of sail to keep her off that coast. I subsequently found the ship to be more to the southward and westward than I supposed. At 5:30 o'clock last Monday morning, the lead was thrown, and as nearly as could be ascertained, we were in from thirteen to fiteen This was about half an hour before fathoms of water. The sea was running very high, and the vessel struck. as the vessel went ashore we braced the yards aback to haul her off, but found it was of no use, as she had gone head on, made two or three thumps, swung around, broadside to, and was fast. At this time the sea broke over the ship and she began to go to pieces. We then got all the passengers from the 'between' decks to the main deck, and ordered out the main boat to run a line ashore. The hatches were not closed, and on the contrary I ordered every passenger up to the main deck at the time she struck.

"The boat reached the shore safe with the line, but



the men let go of it. The mate and four or five seamen were in this boat. They let go of the line, went ashore, and stayed a short time on the beach. The other boats were soon after got out, and the balance of the crew deserted, with two of the cabin passengers. There was an exception in the *desertion* of the crew, as two or three of the sailors staid with me, and assisted in saving passengers. *After the crew had taken away the ship's boats*, the people on the beach attempted to launch a surf-boat, but it did not succeed.

"About noon on Monday, they attempted to shoot the mortar toward us, to give us a line. The first shot went ahead of the ship, the second fell short, and on the third and fourth the wire broke. The next shot made reached the ship, and I got hold of the line, and, with the assistance of the passengers, hauled it on board. With this line a hawser was hauled on board, and to that they attached a life-boat, and we hauled her out to the ship; the life-boat capsized several times, and when we got her alongside she was full of water. I got into the boat to bale her out, and the passengers rushed into her to such an extent that I had to push off; the line parted, and five of them were drowned, and five, with myself, were saved. There was nothing more done, except firing some more shots. When the boat upset I went under her, and could - not extricate myself for several minutes. I finally got on the bottom of the boat with the other four persons, and the men on the beach hauled her ashore, bottom upwards. I saved nothing of the papers or manifest.

"After I got ashore efforts were made to get a line to the ship, but they were unsuccessful. At this time about 150 of the passengers fled to the rigging for safety, and remained there all night. The gale had subsided, and

the atmosphere being warm, with a light southwest breeze, they lived until this morning, when it became more calm, and they were rescued in surf-boats, through the assistance of the surfmen and citizens. The ship's company consisted of myself, first mate, second mate, physician, steward, cook, carpenter, and 23 seamen, all of whom were saved, except the steward and doctor, who were drowned in the cabin before I left the ship. I shipped the steward in Boston. I think his name was George A. Drew. There were two genteel-looking cabin passengers, named Wm. Von Rensielier and Mr. Behue, from Reading, Pennsylvania, who were saved in the first boat, and left for New York.


"Among the lost was the physician of the vessel, who shipped with me in Bremen. A young lady, who was called Miss Dorretti, was washed off and drowned before I left the ship."


Charles H. Griffin, of Brunswick, Maine, a youth of some seventeen or eighteen years, and one of the seamen on board the ship "New Era," says: "She sprung a leak a week or so before she went ashore, and we were compelled to keep both pumps going night and day. For three days previous to our going ashore, we had thick and heavy weather; in fact, during the whole passage we encountered violent head winds. We took soundings at four o'clock on Monday morning and found seventeen fathoms of water: 5:30 we had shoaled to eleven fathoms. We reported the result of our sounding to the

captain, and the second mate came forward and told the watch that from the sand on the lead, we must be near the Jersey shore, and that we must keep a good lookout for land. Two men were placed on the lookout, but the fog was so dense that no object could be discerned more than half a length ahead. About ten minutes after six she struck, while going at the rate of six or seven knots per hour, under close reefed topsails, main topmast staysail, fore topmast staysail, spencer, and spanker. About three o'clock in the morning we had made more sail than we had previously been carrying-had it not been for this we probably should not have been wrecked. Immediately after we grounded, the captain came on deck and gave orders to brace around the yards, which was done, and an effort made to back her off. After several ineffectual attempts we found this impossible, as every sea was driving Orders were then given to her further on the beach. The first boat was manned by clear away the boats. the first and second officers and three of the crew, and started for the shore with a line, but in consequence of the line being too short they did not succeed in getting it ashore, as they were compelled to let it go, although the boat reached the beach. The second boat was then lowered and manned for the purpose of trying to get another line on shore, but the line became entangled on board the ship, and the boat was obliged to let it go also. Our last boat (the long boat) was cleared away and got over the side, to renew the attempt to get a rope to the beach. That boat was large enough to carry about 25 or 30 persons; five or six of the crew got into her to bale At this time the captain was in the mizzen her out. rigging, on the starboard side, and gave us orders about Six of the crew were in her baling, when a the boat.


sea struck her and her painter parted. She was carried away from the ship, and those who were in her were obliged to make for the shore. The ship's surgeon, Dr. Papenhusen, attempted to get into her by lowering himself on a line, but was too late, and the sea washed him off, and he was drowned. The captain then descended to the rigging and came forward to the jib-boom. Eight or ten of the passengers, in attempting to follow him, were carried overboard by the waves. When the ship struck she swung around broadside to the beach, her head to the south: the sea broke over her fore and aft, and in less than an hour she filled and sunk. When the ship struck, the passengers were all between decks, in their berths, with the exception of twelve, who were taking their turn at the pumps. The sea broke over us and rushed into the between decks, drowning many of the women in their berths. Those who could do so, rushed upon deck, many of them nearly in a state of nudity, and ran about the deck shrieking in the most painful tones. The houses on deck, the top of the poop cabin, and every place of shelter, were crowded with them. In the forward house were some fifteen or twenty persons, mostly These were carried overboard, together with women. the house in which they sought refuge, by a tremendous sea that nearly cleared our decks. As many persons as were able ascended the rigging, and clung to it for safety from the great seas that dashed over us. The captain told the people to remain quiet, and they would all get ashore; but they heeded him not, but kept crying for assistance. The captain also shouted at the top of his voice for help from the shore. The poor people on board were being continually swept off into the sea. The whole of the rigging on the star-board side was filled with them,




probably to the number of 200 souls. After several ineffectual attempts, the people on shore succeeded in firing a shot over us, and sending a line across our fore royal stay, and a man on the end of the flying jib boom caught The captain made it fast by the fore stay, and all it. of us hauled the life-boat from the shore to the ship. The captain got into the fore chains, and was followed by a part of the crew. The boat having capsized several times in coming to us, was full of water, and the captain ordered some of the crew to get in and bale her out. As soon as they got in he jumped overboard, and scrambled into the boat, leaving five of the crew and his passengers on board. As soon as he got into the boat he cried out to the people on the beach to haul him on shore. When the passengers saw the captain leaving his ship, ten or twelve of them jumped overboard, and four of them got into the boat-the remainder were drowned. The coast people hauled the boat toward the shore, but she capsized three times in going, and only the captain, three of the crew and one of the passengers got ashore in safety-the remainder were drowned. On her way to the shore the line connecting the shore and the ship parted, and we were left again to despair. The people on shore again fired lines to us, but only one, the last, was successful; this caught on the foretopsail brace, but beyond our reach. By this time it was nearly dark, and the people on shore had exhausted all their shot, while the sea was running so high that they could do nothing for us with their boats. The few members of the crew remaining on board (five of us) lashed ourselves on the jib boom. About ten o'clock on Monday night, a boat from a steamboat came to us, within hailing distance, and asked how we got along; I replied, we should do very well till morning if



the ship held together, but I did not think she would last so long. The captain of the boat told us to hold on and he would soon be off to us with a life-boat and assistance. We got a line ready for lowering ourselves into the boat, and he returned in about half an hour and hailed us again to know how we were. We asked him to come along and take us in. but he waited for fifteen minutes and found it impossible to come, as the sea was so boisterous. About eight o'clock a fire was made up on the shore and kept burning all night, and persons stood by it during the dark-The poor people on board were crying and groanness. ing all night, but no earthly assistance could then be afforded to any of us. About twelve o'clock the sea began to break over our place of shelter on the boom, and we got up onto the forestay and into the foretop. All this time the deck was strewn with dead bodies which the sea washed to and fro against the frames and bulwarks and the rolling spars and rubbish, mangled terribly. A cold westerly wind arose about eight o'clock on Monday evening; the night was very bleak, the blast piercingly cold, and many of the emigrants benumbed and frozen, lost their hold and dropped from the shrouds into the sea and were drowned. Others, exhausted, hung by their legs in the rigging, too feeble to longer maintain their hold, and so perished from suffocation. The scene was too awful for further detail. Thank God, however, after suffering from cold, hunger, and the buffetings of the waves for nearly twenty-six hours amid horrors at which the soul sickens, we were saved. By seven o'clock on Tuesday the sea had fallen considerably, and three surf-boats put off from the shore to our assistance. Through caution and close watching of the rolling waves they saved all that were on board alive (with the exception of four or




five who were drowned in jumping after the boat when they were on their way back to the shore full of people). All were saved before eight o'clock on Tuesday morning. Of many who were washed overboard by the sea, only one woman was saved. She got ashore, some two miles below the ship, in a state of nudity, having been preserved by clinging to a fragment of the wreck."

CHAPTER IV.

PASSENGERS WHO WERE SAVED.



HE captain of the "New Era" stated that he brought 374 steerage passengers, six second, and five first cabin passengers. His crew consisted of 29 persons, and 12 passengers' cooks, making the number of persons on board, including himself, 427. Of these, it is known that the following per-

sons were saved. This list is necessarily imperfect, as the people started for New York as soon as possible, by various routes; but it is as complete as the circumstances would admit of:

First Cabin.—Gustavus Behne, Reading, Pa.; Wm. Von Rougelen, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Second Cabin.—As far as we have been able hitherto to ascertain we have heard of only one person, a lady, Mrs. Emilia Tautz, being saved out of the six persons stated by the captain to have taken their passage in the second cabin. Mrs. Tautz was rescued from the wreck



in a very exhausted state early on Tuesday morning, whence she was at once removed to Mr. Allen's house, where every care was taken of her. Soon after she had been put to bed, however, she miscarried, but is now doing well, being carefully watched by Dr. Walter I. Kimball, of Eatontown, to whom, and to Drs. Pettit and Scriven, too much praise cannot be given for their unwearied care and solicitude for the sick and wounded. Both the husband and brother of Mrs. Tautz were drowned.

One of the passengers, who after being washed overboard was so fortunate as to reach the shore alive, was Mrs. Louisa Heier, a native of Preussenminden, Prussia. She was the only woman washed overboard who was saved, and the only woman saved on Monday at all. One of the heavy seas caused her to lose her hold on the rigging, and suddenly she found herself engulfed in the mad element. After alternately sinking and rising several times, she was conscious of being violently struck by some hard substance. She grasped it firmly, and found in a piece of spar a support with which in a few moments she was dashed upon the beach, fortunately uninjured. She was on her way to Wisconsin.





These names show 122 passengers and 24 of the ship's company saved. But we were informed that 143 passengers and 28 of the ship's crew were safely landed.

The following letter is from Mr. W. M. Wermerkirsch, one of the clerks of the Commissioners of Emigration, who was present at Deal, attending to the survivors of the wreck.

"All the passengers who have recovered from the effects of the fatigue and exposure on the wreck, and who are now here, will be sent to New York to-day. There are eighteen altogether. We have here one woman who has been confined, and a man who has broken his leg. The woman is at Deal Beach; her name is Amelia Danz. Her husband and child both died on board the wreck. Her brother, Theodore Keimmerer, living at 395 Market Street, Philadelphia, is at present at Eatontown, Monmouth County, lying ill, under the care of a physician.

"The people of the surrounding country have been very kind to the survivors. I have given to all the passengers a card to the office of the Commissioners of Emigration in the Park, and I have placed all the sick under the charge of Captain Bowne, the agent of the underwriters to the boat, so that they can be sent to New York. There will be about eighteen altogether, sent to New York to-night (Thursday), as I have said, in addition to those already there. They are all well.

"I have found Captain Bowne a man of energy and humanity, to whom the passengers can never be too thank-



ful for the trouble which he has taken to make them comfortable.

"As we cannot obtain the names of the dead, we have placed, according to our direction, a number on each body, and entered in a memorandum book the following descriptions:

"No. 45.—A female; blue calico dress, under clothing marked N. L., brown hair, small in stature, aged about 16 years, very badly disfigured, found on her person one gold ear-ring, 8 two guilders, 3 ten thalers in gold, 3 gold dollars, and 8 half dollars.


"In order to ascertain the names of the bodies I enquired of the more intelligent passengers, but not one could be recognized, on account of the features being almost totally destroyed. I hope the papers which have been found on some of the passengers will throw more light upon the subject. The following are the only bodies which we have been able thus far to recognize:

"Samuel Rothschild, Frederick Deubel, Johanna Riecks, H. Gruneborg, from Berlin.

"S. Rothschild has a cousin in Savannah, Ga.; J. Deubel had a bill of exchange of \$241.40, dated Bremen, the 15th, 1854; J. Reicks had two bills of exchange, of \$140 and \$60, dated September 13, on Meyer & Stucken, in New York, drawn by Lehman, Oppenheimer & Co. These bills and all the other articles of value found upon the bodies are in the hands of the coroner.

"It is thought that we can get the bodies and trunks, which still remain in the steerage, out by to-morrow. All the coffins and places of burial have been numbered according to your directions.

"The ship now lies with her bulwarks four feet out of water, broadside on the beach, and about two hundred





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yards from the shore, nearly opposite the inlet called the Great Bend.

"We have just numbered the last coffin 119, and have thirty more bodies yet to be disposed of. I have been present at the inspection of all the bodies, in order to ascertain, as far as possible, their names. I have not slept for twenty-four hours, and am endeavoring now to get a few hours' rest."

THE UNIDENTIFIED VICTIMS.

"Up to last evening" (Thursday, November 16), writes the correspondent of the New York Herald, "the hull of the ill-fated ship 'New Era' had not commenced breaking up, and this led to the belief, on the part of the agents of the underwriters, that considerable might vet be saved if the operation of wrecking was proceeded with The captain and the remainder of the immediately. passengers, with the single exception of Amelia Danz, came up to the city last night; no contract had vet been made by the agents for stripping the ship, although no difficulty was anticipated in making the necessary arrangements. On Friday morning (November 17) a heavy sea carried away everything on the deck, and severely damaged the sails and mizzen rigging. She has settled still deeper into the sand, and is now nearly covered at

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water, when the surf washes her yards and sprinkles her royal masts with spray. The presumption that many bodies are yet hidden in the interior of the hold, is rendered stronger by circumstances which develop almost hourly some new feature of the frightful calamity. A second interview with Captain Henry has rendered clearer the cause to which the fearful loss of life may be attributed, he having detailed the events of the wreck, particularizing those parts in which, deserted by his officers and crew, he was left almost alone to superintend the only measure taken for the rescue of the passengers, and giving a fair reason for everything which took place on his part during the trying emergency.

"One hundred and forty-two of the victims have been buried, and of these we have obtained a full description, taken from the coroner's record, an abstract of which is as follows:

Many of these were undoubtedly suffocated in the steerage of the ship, immediately after striking; but as a part were washed off by the action of the waves, it is probable that for weeks to come we shall be reminded of this calamity by the occasional casting up of some lifeless body upon the coast, a sad momento of a terrible episode."





GOVERNOR JOSEPH HIESTER was a distinguished representative of a typical family; one of that class of the population of our great Commonwealth—the Pennsylvania-German—whose blood, in some form, flows through the veins of most of its old families, and whose influence has done much to mould the character of its


people and to place it in the front rank of the great states of this great union.

The remote ancestors of the Hiester family were of Silesian origin. The head of the family was the Knight Premisclorus Hüsterniz, who flourished about 1329, and held the office of mayor, or town captain, of the city of Swineford. In 1480 the Patrician and Counsellor of Swineford, Adolphus Louis, called "der Hiester," obtained from the Emperor Frederick letters patent authorizing him and his descendants to use the coat-of-arms he

had inherited from his ancestors. The Hiester arms are blazoned, "Azure, a sun, or. Crest: Between two horns, surmounting a helmet affronté, the sun as in the arms." Dr. Laurence Hiester—1637—an eminent surgeon of his day in Germany, was a member of the family. It is most probable that General de Hiester, commanding the Hessian contingent at the battle of Long Island, where he was directly opposed to his American namesake, was likewise a descendant from the same original head. From Silesia the family was distributed throughout Austria, Bavaria, Saxony, Switzerland, and the countries bordering on the river Rhine.

The various members in this country spring from three brothers, John, Joseph and Daniel, who were the sons of John and Catharine Hiester, and emigrated from the town of Elsoff, in the Grafschaft, County of Wittgenstein, province of Westphalia, Germany. Almost without exception the entire offspring of these brothers have occupied honorable stations in life, many of them reaching positions of especial distinction.

The first to arrive in America was John, who reached these shores in 1732, and took up his residence at Goshenhoppen, then in Philadelphia, now Montgomery County. He was followed by Joseph and Daniel, on the ship *St. Andrew*, from Rotterdam, who took the oath of allegiance at Philadelphia on September 26, 1737, and immediately joined their brother. Here Daniel at once purchased a farm, already somewhat improved. After various journeys of exploration, and a better acquaintance with the country, the brothers united in buying a tract of land from the Proprietary Government, between two and three thousand acres in size, in Bern Township of the present Berks County, extending from the Bern church to the



Tulpehocken Creek. Here John and Joseph settled whilst Daniel remained at the old homestead.

I have said the Hiester family was a typical Pennsylvania-German family. Happily, the time has practically passed by when these people can be any longer misunderstood and maligned by those who, frequently, "were not worthy to unloose their shoe's latchet," and it is now generally known that, instead of being either mercenary gentlemen adventurers or the worthless off-scouring from the slums of large cities, their early representatives were, as a rule, worthy descendants of patrician German families, or, possibly, of the better German peasantry, rarely without education, and, still more rarely, without the means of procuring their own homes. They were of the best blood of Europe, who, after generations of ceaseless wars and persecutions, had come to another world where they might worship their God and rear their families in peace. Here, to save their new homes, and protect their more fortunate neighbors in "the lower counties," they stood like a living wall behind the Blue Range and stopped the encroachment of the savage during the French and Indian Here, again, when British oppression once more war. threatened their liberty, like one man they espoused the cause of American freedom, and history, too long silent, is beginning to tell somewhat of their deeds in the upbuilding of this nation. There were no Tories amongst the Pennsylvania-Germans. In these momentous events many of the Hiesters were most prominent. Indeed, practically without exception, every male member of the family, of suitable age, took up arms in defense of his country's liberty.

Of the three brothers, Daniel, the youngest, was born Jan. 1, 1713. For many years he resided in Old Goshen-




hoppen, Upper Salford township of Montgomery County, immediately below the present village of Sumneytown. He acquired much property, built a fine, two-story brick mansion in 1757, still standing, and became prominent. In the year 1774 he removed to Berks County and took up his residence in Reading. He married Catharine Schuler, daughter of Gabriel Schuler, died June 7, 1795, and is buried beside his wife (to the right of her) at the stone Bern church, Berks County. They have a common grave-stone. Their issue was as follows:

1. Anna Margaretha, b. June 26, 1743, m. May 23, 1761, Philip Hahn, of New Hanover Township, d. Feb. 11, 1820, buried at Falkner Swamp Reformed church, Montgomery County.

2. John, b. April 9, 1745, m. Hannah Pawling, d. Oct. 15, 1821, at Pottstown, Pa. During the Revolution he was Captain 1st company, 4th battalion, Chester County militia, 1777, Colonel William Evans, and later, captain 1st battalion, 1777, Colonel John Haunum. After the war he became major general of militia. From 1802 to 1806 he represented Chester County in the State Senate, and, from 1807 to 1809, in the National Congress.

3. Daniel, b. June 25, 1747, m. about 1770 Rosanna Hager, of Hagerstown, Md., d. March 7, 1804, in Washington, D. C. He was commissioned colonel of the Philadelphia County militia in 1777, and saw a variety of active service until May 23, 1782, when he was promoted to brigadier general. He was a member of the First, Second, Third and Fourth Congress, from Pennsylvania, and likewise served from 1800 to March 7, 1804, the date of his death, as a member from Maryland.

4. Gabriel, b. June 17, 1749, m. about 1773, Elizabeth Bausman, d. Sept. 1, 1824, on the ancestral farm in Bern



Township, Berks County. He was a member of the convention of July 15, 1776; major of militia during the campaign of 1776–7; member of the Assembly, except for two or three years, from 1778 to 1790; member of the House of Representatives in 1791, and, again, from 1802 to 1804; State Senator in 1795–6, also from 1805 to 1812.

5. Catharine, b. Sept. 30, 1751, m. Jonathan Bischoff.

6. Samuel, b. April 17, 1754, d. in childhood.

7. William, b. June 10, 1757, m. March 18, 1784, Anna Maria Myers, d. July 13, 1822. Notwithstanding his youth he was enrolled and served in one campaign of the Revolutionary war, in Captain George Wills' company of his brother Major Gabriel Hiester's battalion, 1777.

Joseph, the next brother, was born about 1710 and died about 1772, before the commencement of the war. He was married to Elizabeth Strunk. His life was passed, uneventfully, on the farm in Bern Township, and his remains rest in the graveyard of the old church nearby. He left a more numerous progeny than either of his brothers. ` The immediate children were:

1. John, b. Sept. 25, 1754, m. Catharine Albright, d. Sept. 17, 1826.



It will be seen that but one, or two at most, of the male members of this branch were capable of bearing arms. Whether either did so serve their country cannot be told from the imperfect records at hand.

The last, and eldest, of the brothers was John, the father of the subject of this biography, born in 1707, died in 1757 on the homestead in Bern Township, where he also lies buried in the same graveyard with his brother. He was married to Mary Barbara Epler, b. Aug. 16, 1732, d. Oct. 5, 1809, a daughter of one of the first settlers in that section of the country. Their descendants were:

1. Catharine, b. Sept. 16, 1750, d. June 24, 1824, m. John Ruth.


2. Joseph, the governor.

3 and 4. Sons, who died young and whose names are not recorded.

Joseph, then, was the only living son of his father. He was born on the farm in Bern Township, Berks County, Pa., Nov. 18, 1752. He grew up a farmer's boy, learning the manifold duties pertaining to his occupation, doubtless often weary and, possibly, at times longing for a change to something less monotonous, but still always breathing in Heaven's pure air and reading lessons from nature's picture book which he might seek in vain elsewhere. It is a fact worth remembering that, from lads so situated, have sprung some of our greatest men. He frequently took pleasure, during his later years, in relating his experiences at that time. He was put to the plow so young that, when it struck a stump or stone, and was thrown from the furrow, he was unable to replace it until it had

run quite a distance, and if, perchance, he caught a root the rebound would be sufficient to throw him to the ground. His sources of amusement were those common to the country, with a chance visit, on special occasions, to Reading, but a few miles distant, then a village of less than two thousand inhabitants, which doubtless looked as great in his eyes as does now, to the more experienced traveler, the busy, prosperous and beautiful city of 100,000 people to which it has since grown.

Opportunities for the acquisition of an education are generally denied the pioneer settler, who removes himself and family far from the places where learning is taught. But, whilst this rule holds good with probably every other nationality, it does not hold good in the case of the German emigrant. Coming, as he did, from a land where it was discreditable to lack in the ordinary rudiments of knowledge, and, imbued as he was, with a strong religious sentiment, his first care, in his new home, was to erect a log church and procure a pastor, so that whilst the body was well cared for the soul might not lack its still more important "bread of life"; his next step was the establishment of a parochial school in connection with the church, that there might be no want of nourishment for the brain. This school was held at times in the church during the week, but rather, when possible, in a separate building erected for the purpose. Occasionally instruction was imparted by the pastor himself, but, more generally, by a school-master, whose position was second only to that of the clergyman. But, whether pastor or school-master, he was always an educated man, and the knowledge thus received became so solid a foundation that on it many a pupil was enabled to rear a lasting and beautiful fabric. Such a school had the old Bern church, situate about one



mile south from Joseph's home, and this he attended in the intervals of his farm labors. The Bern church was probably organized about 1739. In 1743 ground was purchased, and on it a log house erected, which gave place, about 1762, to a rough stone building. This stood until 1837 when replaced by the present edifice. It was, originally, the exclusive property of a German Reformed congregation, but became, later, a Union (Reformed and Lutheran) church. It is to be regretted that the existing records of this old congregation are so imperfect as to make it impossible to ascertain the name of its schoolmaster from 1760 to 1770. It is possible that Mr. Good, the great-grandfather of Rev. James I. Good, D.D., of Reading, Pa., may have been the incumbent as early as 1770, although it is more likely he occupied the position a vear or two later.

Feeling, doubtless, the lack of opportunity at his quiet country home to satisfy a proper ambition and elevate himself somewhat in the world, he removed to Reading before he had reached the period of legal manhood, and entered the general merchandise store of Adam Witman. He had been there but a short time when he not only gained a satisfactory knowledge of his employer's business, but he gained something else—the heart of his employer's daughter, Elizabeth. In 1771 they were united in blissful wedlock, and, for a few years, the stream of life flowed on quietly, peacefully and happily, during which time he was associated with his father-in-law in the business upon which he had entered.

In the meanwhile, however, the clouds had been gathering ominously over the land, and, at last, in 1775, the storm broke which was ordained by God to sweep away the last vestige of British rule and oppression in this coun-

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


Governor Joseph Hiester.

try, to make us a free people, to bring to the surface the latent manhood and ability in Joseph Hiester, and to elevate him, eventually, to the highest position in the gift of this great Commonwealth. The news of Lexington, Concord and Bunker Hill had spread, like wildfire, over the land. He had already seen Captain George Nagle's company of riflemen, the "First Defenders" of the Revolution, march away from Reading to join Washington before Boston, which place they reached July 18, 1775, barely one month after the call for volunteers sent out by Congress June 14th. Then came the evacuation of Boston, the gathering of troops and formation of armies for the terrible and momentous struggle which was now apparent to all. The time for action was at hand, and, when that time came, young Hiester, though still but a comparative youth, put behind him all thoughts of business, even of those he loved most, and, without any hope of honor or emolument, stepped to the front, offered his services and, if need be, his life to his country, and began his public career.

To understand this career upon which he entered it seems almost necessary to briefly trace the events, especially in Pennsylvania, which led up to his time. With the peace of 1763 came general rejoicing, shared equally between the mother country and her American colonies which had aided materially in bringing it about. But England soon found herself laboring under the increased debt occasioned by the war. How should these obligations be met? The ministry finally determined that the colonies must stand their proportion of the tax, basing their action upon the specious argument that this was just and right because the debt had been incurred on their account, and forgetting that the colonies were already bearing more than their

share of the debt in question. The two measures by which this policy was publicly avowed were the Sugar Bill and the proposed Stamp Act. This at once raised an energetic protest from nearly all the American colonies. The Massachusetts House of Representatives ordered a committee of correspondence with the other colonies, and James Otis, in a pamphlet, exclaimed, "that by this (the British) constitution, every man in the dominion is a free man; that no part of His Majesty's dominions can be taxed without their consent." In other words, if the colonies have no representatives in Parliament to voice their opinion and vote accordingly, then Parliament has no right to tax them. Nevertheless, on March 14, 1764, there was reported to the House of Commons what is ordinarily called the "Sugar Act," whereby England was given a monopoly of the colonial commerce and production, much to the detriment of the Americans, as they were forbidden to take advantage of higher prices offered by other governments for their material. The Act was passed without meeting with opposition, and, at the same time, the House of Commons resolved "that it may be proper to charge certain stamp duties in the colonies," but Mr. Grenville postponed legislation on this proposition for one year, until the feeling of the colonies might be better ascertained. Then came another indignant protest from across the ocean. Washington, at the time a burgess of Virginia, called it "this unconstitutional method of taxation," and the Assemblies of the colonies unanimously and vigorously opposed it. Notwithstanding all this it was duly enacted into a law on March 22, 1765. The excitement was intense. Upon the proposition of Massachusetts it was decided that delegates from the several colonies should meet in convention and agree upon united action. This resulted



in the first congress of the colonies, which met at New York on October 5, 1765, nine colonies being represented, amongst them Pennsylvania, whose delegates were John Dickinson, Joseph Fox (Speaker of the Assembly), with Messrs. Bryan and Morton.

Inharmonious as were, generally, the meetings of this congress, and what else could be expected, yet it resulted in a "Declaration of Rights and Liberties," on October 19th, which notwithstanding their temperate tone, may be said to have foretold the near birth of the new nation. In it were expressed these principles: No taxation without direct representation, which representation was, because of geographical position, practically impossible; all supplies furnished the crown by the colonies are free gifts of the people; the inherent right of trial by jury.

At once "non-importation and non-consumption" became the watchword of the Americans; it was found impossible to enforce the Stamp Act, and, with the advent of the Rockingham Ministry into power, to the great joy of every one it was finally repealed, after a violent struggle in the House of Commons, on February 22, 1766. Accompanying the repeal, however, was the famous declaratory resolve of Parliament, which seemed necessary to save the pride of the ministry, that they still had the "right" to tax the colonies "in all cases whatsoever."

Joy soon gave way to new forebodings with the advent of the following year, when another effort was made by Parliament to increase the revenues by the imposition of duties on paints, glass, tea, etc. Worse still the moneys so derived were to be applied to paying the expenses of the troops quartered in the colonies, as well as the royal judges and governors. The feeling against England grew in bitterness and, by the summer of 1768, became intensely

hostile, so much so that the mother country felt some decided action was necessary and dispatched a vessel of war, with two regiments of troops, under General Gage, to Boston harbor, to preserve order and protect the custom house officers. Threats of changing the charter were made, and it was proposed to remove to England for trial those persons who were charged with certain offences against the crown. A perpetual irritation was kept up between the officers of the English Government in Boston and the townspeople, culminating in what is ordinarily called the "Boston massacre," March 5, 1770. The events which gradually followed this occurrence, and the sufferings of the people of Massachusetts in general, but of Boston in particular, because of oppressive Parliamentary acts are familiar, and we are not surprised that in 1774, she sent an appeal to her sister colonies for material aid. It resulted in the convention of the First Continental Congress at Philadelphia on September 5, 1774. The delegates from Pennsylvania were Messrs. Galloway, the Speaker of the Assembly, Rhoads, Mifflin, Humphreys, Morton, George Ross and Edward Biddle. This body, whilst reaffirming their allegiance to the Royal Government, petitioned the King for redress, and determined upon non-commercial intercourse so long as the wrongs remained unabated.

We have seen the evils which gave birth to the Continental Congress. It was this Congress which led our nation safely through the Revolutionary war and issued the famous Declaration of Independence. This great paper, however, came into being only through mighty travail, and as the German representatives of Pennsylvania, of which Joseph Hiester was one, were mainly instrumental in its existence, we dare not neglect the part taken by that colony in said events.

Not all the colonies were of one mind as to the course to be taken in dealing with Great Britain. Massachusetts, which had suffered much, was naturally most aggressive. Hardly had the first congress adjourned, October 26, 1774, when she organized and armed her militia, and, eventually, precipitated the hostilities which opened the Pennsylvania, on the other hand, had suffered but war. little. Then, again, her population was not of a homogeneous character. About one third of her people were English Quakers, who were essentially law-abiding, patient and long-suffering, with a religion which discountenanced armed resistance; another third were the Germans, speaking a different language, with a kindly feeling towards the followers of Penn who had afforded them a peaceful asylum in the New World, and unmolested, as yet, by any overt acts of British oppression; the balance was made up of a variety of peoples, the majority being Scotch-Irish Presbyterians. It was but natural, therefore, that, at this period of history, she should be somewhat more conservative than her sister colonies, and hold rather more tenaciously to the idea of non-separation from the mother country, a feeling expressed by all the colonies alike, to be sure, but one which was undergoing more rapid changes elsewhere.

Events, however, were hastening on. Very unfortunately, the respectful address of the first congress to the King, pleading for redress and reconciliation, seems to have been misunderstood, and was, accordingly, "pigeonholed." Still more unfortunately, new measures of oppression, and of a more general character, were instituted. Blood had been shed at Lexington and Bunker Hill; troops had been raised by the various colonies to form an army, in which duty the Assembly of Pennsylvania had

been by no means negligent; the people were becoming more generally aroused, and far-seeing men already began to realize the necessity and certainty of separation from England. When, therefore, Congress again convened in 1776 an effort was made, by the New England delegates in particular, to bring about such separation. The motion was made by Richard Henry Lee, of Virginia, and seconded by John Adams, of Massachusetts, on June 7, 1776, "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown; and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."

The success or failure of the motion depended upon the action of the Pennsylvania delegates. With John Dickinson at their head they immediately opposed it, and remained firm in their opposition. Of the sincerity of their motives there can be no question, and no imputation dare be cast upon them. They felt the action to be premature. But, whether right or wrong, the result was the same. It became certain that so long as these gentlemen represented the colony the Congress could not hope to pass the motion, and how to obtain another representation was a puzzling question. They were the duly accredited delegates of a legal Assembly.

The Assembly of Pennsylvania differed from many others. Its members were elected by a limited suffrage, under the charter granted by William Penn in 1701, and it was composed, in a great measure, of those whose religious principles forbade them to declare or maintain war. Each member was obliged to take an oath of allegiance to George III before entering upon his duties. It was but natural that such a body should be cautious and conserva-



tive under the circumstances. Their first endeavor was to preserve the charter under which they acted, and then to postpone a separation from the mother country. The popular clamor, however, against them was very great, and they were obliged to make continual concessions. The German element had now fully awakened to a thorough understanding of the events transpiring about them, and were become intensely loyal. The Scotch-Irish had always been antagonistic to the British cause, and the newspapers were filled with articles reflecting upon the members because of their oaths of supremacy and obedience to the King.

Alarmed and somewhat panic-stricken by the popular demands made upon it the Assembly abdicated somewhat of its power even more rapidly than those opposed to it had expected. On May 24th a resolution was offered that a committee be appointed to report upon a plan "rendering the naturalization laws hitherto in force, and the oaths or affirmations of allegiance, unnecessary in all cases where they are required or have been usually taken in this colony." Previous to that, on March 15th, another resolution had already been passed providing for seventeen additional representatives—four from the city, two each from Lancaster, York, Cumberland, Berks and Northampton, and one each from Bedford, Northumberland and Westmoreland. It utterly refused, however, to rescind its instructions to the delegates in Congress.

This body, weary of long delay and finally hopeless of a satisfactory conclusion, somewhat arbitrarily, it must be admitted, cut the gordian knot by recommending, May 15th, to each colony, the adoption of a new constitution for their better government, where the exigency of affairs might render such action necessary. It was unquestionably

intended to be a blow aimed at the life of the Proprietary Government. To add to the discomfiture of the Assembly the battalions of associators rebelled against its authority. Still the Assembly remained firm in its purpose and determination not to establish a new government. At last the members of the Whig party held a meeting in the State House Yard on May 20th and applied to the "Committee of Inspection and Observation of the City and Liberties" to call a conference of the committees of the several counties, that these committees might direct the election of a convention which should frame a new constitution. This conference met in Philadelphia, on June 18th, calling themselves "Conferees and Delegates of the people of Pennsylvania for forming a plan for executing the resolution of Congress passed on the 15th of May." At their head were men like Dr. Benjamin Franklin and Colonel McKean, and, however revolutionary the action may have been, it was made necessary by the condition of affairs. For the first time in its history Pennsylvania was no longer under the rule of English law but was beginning to be "a government of the people, by the people and for the people." The old Assembly still attempted to meet thereafter but failed of a quorum, and finally died a natural death of "innocuous desuetude."

It was this convention, representing the wishes of a majority of the people of Pennsylvania, which cast its vote for separation from the mother country, and thus made possible the Declaration of Independence. For the first time in the history of the State men of German extraction had been elected representatives, and, as representation was in accordance with population and counties, these men held the balance of power and gave the deciding vote. Who can deny then the assertion that were it

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not for the loyal and patriotic Pennsylvania-Germans there might never have been a Declaration of Independence, and that, to this day, these great and United States might still be dependent colonies of Great Britain.

The ten men in the convention from Berks County were: Col. Jacob Morgan, Col. Henry Haller, Col. Benjamin Spyker, Col. Daniel Hunter, Col. Valentine Eckert, Col. Nicholas Lutz, Capt. Joseph Hiester, Dr. Bodo Otto, Mark Bird and Charles Shoemaker, all men great in brave deeds for their country, whose names may well be immortalized, and not the least deserving among them was Joseph Hiester.

This convention met June 18, 1776, at Carpenter Hall, Philadelphia, and, by adjournments, continued in session until June 25th. It was distinguished for its vigor and patriotism. Amongst those elected to it from Philadelphia were Benjamin Franklin, Col. Thomas McKean, Col. Timothy Matlack and Dr. Benj. Rush, also many zealous and distinguished men from the interior. Col. McKean was chosen president.

They resolved to call a Provincial Convention "for the express purpose of forming a new government in this province *on the authority of the people only.*" On this Hiester voted in the affirmative.

They further resolved that no person should be permitted to vote for members of the proposed convention who should not, on oath or affirmation, declare, "I do not hold myself bound to bear allegiance to George III, King of Great Britain," and, further, "I will oppose any measure that shall or may interfere with or obstruct the religious principles of any of the good people of this Province." Again Hiester voted in the affirmative.

Then followed a resolution, on June 23d, that Thomas 6

McKean, Benj. Rush, and Col. Smith be a committee to draft a resolution in favor of the "Independence of the Province of Pennsylvania from the Crown and Parliament of Great Britain," in favor of which he again voted, and, subsequently, on June 24th, also in favor of the report of the committee to declare "the United Colonies free and independent States."

This conference, of sound and worthy patriots, likewise recommended to the people of Pennsylvania to, forthwith, make a levy of 4,500 troops, in addition to the men already in service, and finally adjourned on June 25, 1776, after a session of eight days.

The names alone of the actors in this most important drama are sufficient evidence to show that they were men of deeds, fully equal to the words they had just uttered. Mr. Hiester at once hastened home to raise a company of volunteer "Associators," for active service, as a part of the so-called "Flying camp." Full of enthusiasm, young, vigorous and influential, he was quickly successful. On July 10th, by beat of drum, he gathered his fellow townsmen about him, then, in an address full of patriotism, he laid the condition of affairs before them. He explained the need of their country for soldiers, and the call of their State for volunteers, with the situation of their beloved general, Washington, then, already, believed to be perilous, and ended up by requesting them to join his new company as recruits. Laying down the sum of \$40 upon his drum head he said, "I will give this sum as a bounty, and the appointment of a sergeant, to the first man who will subscribe the articles of association to form a volunteer company, to march, forthwith, and join the commander-inchief, and I also pledge myself to furnish the company with blankets and necessary funds for their equipment,



and on the march." This promise he honorably and faithfully fulfilled. After a moment's consideration Matthias Babb stepped forward, from amongst his neighbors, signed the articles and took the money from the drum head. His example, and the further inducements of smaller sums of money, caused twenty more recruits to join that same evening, and, by July 20th, the total number enrolled footed up ninety-six. When we recall that the total population of Reading, at this time, was less than two thousand, we can readily see that the showing in question was most creditable.

The quota of Berks County, in the levy of 4,500, was 666 men. Recruiting went on at a lively rate. Notices were sent out and meetings held in all parts of the county; in a short time the entire quota was raised and one company besides. Mr. Hiester was most active in all this work, and, because of his liberality and popularity, it was soon seen that he would undoubtedly be chosen by the soldiers as the commanding officer of the regiment. Just before this culminating point was reached, however, it is said that Mr. Henry Haller, a fellow-citizen of Reading, came to him and frankly admitted his desire to be Colonel of the regiment, at the same time acknowledging that, without his consent, it would be impossible to obtain the position, and requesting his co-operation, which, of course, meant his withdrawal from the candidacy. Mr. Hiester heard, with patient attention, all that was argued and suggested by Mr. Haller, and then said, "The office you seek must be the gift of our fellow soldiers, but I do assure you I am not anxious for command or distinction, further than they may enable me the more effectually to serve our country. I will willingly yield all claim rather than that our country shall not have your services." The declara-

tion thus made was followed up by Mr. Hiester who fully conversed with the troops, declined to be a candidate himself and urged the election of Mr. Haller.

His ready acquiescence in this instance led to a similar request from Mr. Edward Burd, who was anxious to obtain the position of major and yet knew how hopeless his efforts would be so long as Mr. Hiester was in the field. Again he consented, and once more used his influence to assure the election of his neighbor, content to assume, for himself, the more humble rank of a captain.

I trust the reader will feel that these incidents are told, not to reflect upon the two gentlemen named, whose faithful service to their country places them above harsh criticism, but merely to show the character of the man whose biography we are sketching, and to bring out the spirit of unselfish patriotism which animated him and influenced all his actions.

The battalion to which Captain Hiester belonged was officered as follows: Colonel, Henry Haller; Lieut.-Colonel, Nicholas Lutz; Major, Edward Burd; Captains, Jacob Graul, Joseph Hiester, Jacob Maurer, John Ludwig, John Old, — Douglass, and Peter Decker. Unfortunately the muster roll of Capt. Hiester's company is not in existence, and we have only mention besides Matthias Babb of Nicholas Brown, his ensign, and Stephen Futterer, a private. They formed the Third Battalion of Pennsylvania Associators.

The men were well equipped, and started out promptly to reinforce the main army. Colonel Haller, however, was unable to accompany them, being obliged to remain back and attend to the organization of the other companies of "Associators" still forming. The battalion, therefore, went through the impending compaign under

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command of Lieut.-Colonel Lutz, and is better known as "Lutz's Battalion." Upon their arrival at Elizabethtown, New Jersey, they were met by Lord Stirling who had been sent to expedite the march of the American troops and, from him, learned that Washington was busily engaged in preparing to oppose the momentarily expected advance, on New York City, of the British under General Howe, who with nearly 30,000 troops, composed of English, Highlanders and Hessians, lay in the Lower Bay.

Now we come to an incident which, whilst reflecting renewed credit upon our young captain, must be read with charity and understandingly, in so far as it refers to his The sudden approach of danger and unexpected men. call to immediate active service, came with too little warning to men who had just left their homes. Then, again, we must remember that the so-called "Associators" were merely what are now denominated as "militia," amongst whom the principal feeling was that they had enlisted mainly to defend their own homes and locality. Had the very same men been recruits in the Pennsylvania Line Regiments, then just forming, they would have been prepared to march anywhere, as ordered. What now took place was only what has occurred in every war since then. When the orders to march into New York came as they did, and so unexpectedly, the soldiers refused to obey them, declaring that it was unreasonable to ask them to go further. How far the disaffection spread we do not know, but we are aware that it included the men of Captain Graul's company, as well as a portion of Captain Hiester's. It was a critical and painful state of affairs. What could be done to obviate it? Drawing his men around him, in a compact body, Captain Hiester pleaded with them in such honest, suitable and impassioned language that their hearts

went out to him and beat in unison with his. One who was present on the occasion said, "I wish to God I could tell you what the Captain said, and how the men looked and felt." "You have marched thus far," said he, "resolved to fight your country's foes, and defend your homes and families, and will you now prove cowards, and desert your country when your country most needs your help? I would be ashamed to return home with you! I will go forward, yes, if I go by myself! I will go and join General Washington as a volunteer, as a private, and, if you will not go, I will go alone; but, surely, you will not turn your backs upon the enemy, and leave your country at their mercy. I will try you once again. Fall in ! Fall in to your ranks, men, and those who are ready to fight for freedom and America will, when the drum beats and the word is given, march to join George Washington !" The men fell in, shouldered their muskets, the drums were beat, and, at the command "March!" every one stepped out save three, who hesitated but a moment and then hurried to join their comrades. Three cheers were given and they were on the road to Long Island.

At New York there was one whose eyes anxiously watched, not only for them but for all possible reinforcements. The enemy was about to advance on this important city; the Declaration of Independence had just been made, and all looked for victory to give encouragement to the new-born cause, yet none knew better than himself how little prepared he was to accomplish the great deeds expected of him. However, all possible preparations were made for the conflict at hand, and as the salvation of the entire American army engaged in it eventually hung upon the bravery of the Pennsylvanians, especially the troops

from the German counties of Berks and Northampton, of which our Reading contingency was a part, we dare not pass by its details too lightly.

To stem the approaching storm Washington had, nominally, some 27,000 troops, mostly militia, of whom one fourth were invalids and another fourth scarcely furnished with arms. To protect all possible points of attack, it was necessary that the American army should occupy various positions. The main body lay on the island of New York, which seemed destined to receive the first blows of the English. Two feeble detachments guarded Governors Island and the point of Paulus Hook. The militia of the Province, under General Clinton, were posted upon the banks of the Sound where they occupied the two Chesters, East and West, and New Rochelle, to prevent the enemy from penetrating to Kingsbridge, and thus locking up the Americans on the island of New York.

One corps only was stationed on Long Island, numbering not over 5,000 men, under the orders of General Greene, who was obliged, however, to relinquish his command to General Sullivan because of sickness. The right of this corps, under General Lord Stirling, rested on the shore, within the southern boundary of the present Greenwood cemetery. Colonel Atlee, of the Musketry Battalion, with the other Pennsylvanians, of which Lutz's Battalion and that of Lieut.-Colonel Kichlein, of Northampton County, were a part, lay south of Gowanus Bav, close to the water (near Twenty-third street), and were the extreme right. Next to them were the Delaware troops, under Colonel Hazlet, and the Marvland Regiment of Colonel Smallwood. Sullivan's centre lay amongst the wooded hills, guarding the Flatbush Pass, now Battle Pass, in Prospect Park. Colonel Miles, and his Battalion,

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the Pennsylvania Rifle Regiment, occupied the extreme left. It was the latter's duty to guard the road by Flatland, and scour the country over to Jamaica to prevent a flank movement by the British. In spite of the ease with which this could have been done the duty was, most unfortunately, neglected, and was instrumental in the terrible disaster which followed. Colonel Miles, probably, was not alone to blame in his negligence, as both Generals Putnam and Sullivan felt equally assured of the fact that the British attack would be on their right and centre. The front door was securely locked and the back door wide open.

Opposed to the American right was the British left, 2,000 men and ten cannon, under General Grant; their centre was composed of the Hessians, 8,000 in number, and, with fully 8,000 more and a train of artillery, under Clinton, Cornwallis and Percy, the enemy started, during the night, to circumvent the American left. Nearly twenty thousand trained and well-equipped veteran soldiers against five thousand raw recruits.

This was the condition of affairs on the night of August 26, 1776. To divert attention from their movement towards Jamaica the British prepared to attack fiercely the American right on the early morning of the 27th. General Stirling's outpost lay at the Red Lion Inn, near the Narrows, on the Martense Lane leading from the old Flatbush and New Utrecht road to the Gowanus road, running by Gowanus Cove to the village of Brooklyn. Here Major Edward Burd, of Lutz's Battalion, with some 200 men, was stationed. At this point the British effected their landing, and, about midnight, a force, under Colonel Dalrymple, suddenly fell upon Major Burd, surrounded him, and, after a short fight, compelled the surrender of



nearly the whole party. The indications are that Captain Hiester was amongst those captured at this time. The alarm was at once communicated to General Putnam, in the rear, who at 3 a. m. ordered a Maryland, Delaware and Connecticut regiment forward to reinforce the Pennsylvania-Germans under Colonel Kichlein, who had formed across the Martense Lane and, unflinchingly, were holding in check the British advance. At last, under their galling fire, the enemy were compelled to retreat, and Colonel Atlee's skirmishers, to which belonged the remnant of Lutz's Battalion, who had been driven back along the Gowanus road but now bravely led the reinforcements under Stirling, were enabled to reoccupy their early position.

General Grant, having been reinforced by two regiments from the British fleet, lav within half a mile of the Americans, and for six hours, desultory, and, at times, hard fighting went on, but the enemy did not seem to care to force an issue. The reason for this was very clear, and soon apparent. The main force of the British, finding the American left but poorly guarded, had flanked Colonel Miles' Rifle Regiment, and, after severe fighting, with much loss to the Americans, had doubled them up on Sullivan's centre, which was busily engaged with the Hessians under De Hiester. Overwhelmed by the enemy on both sides the American centre was at once put to flight, and the Hessians immediately fell upon Stirling's rear. At the same moment Grant, who was but waiting this occurrence, fiercely attacked the Pennsylvanians in front. Colonel Atlee's skirmishers were soon slaughtered or made prisoners. After bravely fighting and repulsing, with heavy loss, various detachments of British troops they noticed the Hessians coming down their left flank and at-

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tempting to surround them. The Colonel then ordered a party of Lutz's Battalion to join him in an attempt to break through the enemy's lines, but the number of Americans was so small compared to the host of those opposed to them that they considered the risk too great and hesitated so long that they were driven back into the woods. Here a council of officers was held, but, even whilst deliberating upon their course of action, the Hessians poured in upon them such a heavy volley from the edge of the woods as to completely disperse those that still remained in the command. Colonel Atlee, Captain John Nice and Ensign Henderson, keeping together, managed to gather about them some twenty men from the different battalions, and, with them, were about to make an attempt to force their way through the enemy when they suddenly came upon a large body of Hessians, as they turned out to be, for they were deceived by their uniforms of blue with red trimmings, took them for some of their own people, and allowed them to approach within fifty yards when they received a volley. Retreating from these superior numbers they had proceeded about one hundred and fifty yards when they saw, close to them, a battalion of Highlanders who immediately fired into them. Running through the woods they came to the lowlands where another strong body of Hessians met them and fired on them, one of the enemy being so bold as to charge into their midst where he was killed by the Americans. Finding they were pursued they ran across a swamp, where the water and mud was up to their knees, and took position on higher ground just in time to receive another volley from their right. They had gone a short distance further towards the Jamaica Road when they were joined by Colonel Lutz and four men, the sole remnant of his battalion, under com-

mand. Here they paused for council. Finding themselves completely hemmed in on every side, and further resistance not only useless but fatal, they decided to avoid the Hessians, whose cruelty they feared, and surrender to the British should they meet them. On coming out of the wood they saw two battalions of Highlanders facing them, as well as the Hessians who kept firing at them constantly. Clubbing their muskets, in token of submission, the twenty-five men who were left were given quarter by the British and sent to headquarters under guard.

General Stirling, attacked in the rear, gathered some three hundred brave Marylanders about him, directing the remainder of his forces to retreat as best they could, and then fought until his soldiers had fallen, almost to a man, under the fire and bayonets of the Hessians and British of Cornwallis, when he surrendered his sword to De Hiester. The Connecticut regiment soon met the fate of Colonel Atlee's Pennsylvanians, and then Grant's entire force fell upon the unaided Pennsylvania-Germans under Colonel Kichlein, who alone were left to stem the tide of British victory. Were they to give way it might mean destruction to the fleeing American army now seeking shelter under the guns of Putnam's fortifications at Gowanus Cove. Though they had been left in "the jaws of death," manfully they stood their ground in the face of overwhelming foes, under the Greenwood Hills, where, to-day, a monument marks the scene of their heroism. General Grant, who had boasted that with 5,000 British soldiers "he could march from one end of the colonies to the other," had already fallen dead beneath the unerring aim of one of their riflemen. Many another foe was made to "bite the dust," but the issue could be of no uncertain character. One by one these noble men fell, until, at last,


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the brave regiment was no more, many of its members having been actually massacred, pinned to trees by the enemy's bayonet, slaughtered in cold blood. Of the company from Easton, Colonel Kichlein's home, which went into the battle with less than one hundred men, seventy-one were either killed, wounded, or captured, amongst the wounded being their brave commander. It has been truly said, by an abler pen than the writer's, that "Long Island was the Thermopylæ of the Revolution, and the Pennsylvania-Germans were its Spartans."

Whilst Captain Hiester, who was probably made prisoner in the early part of the engagement, may not have been called upon to bear his share of the later strife, who will say that he would not have valiantly taken his place by the side of his countrymen had it been otherwise? It is to be regretted that no list is extant of the losses in his company or battalion. We have merely a partial list of the officers captured, who were Lieut.-Colonel Lutz, Major Burd and Captains Graul, Hiester, Maurer and Decker, with Lieutenant Stephen Baldy.

The treatment of their prisoners by the British, at New York, will ever be a foul blot on their name. Their victory at Brooklyn, and subsequent capture of Fort Washington in the following November, placed some 4,000 prisoners in their hands, which number was constantly augmented by the arrest of private citizens, capture of privateers, etc. The only two prisons in the city were the "new" jail, still standing, though much altered, as the Hall of Records, and the Bridewell, located in the space between the present City Hall and Broadway. These were quickly filled to overflowing when other buildings were occupied, such as several of the churches, the hospital, and Columbia College, but especially three large

sugar houses—Rhinelander's, on the corner of William and Duane streets; Van Courtlandt's, on the northwest corner of Trinity churchyard and Thames street; and a third, the most noted, a five-story stone building which stood a few feet east of the middle Dutch church, at what is now Nos. 34 and 36 Liberty street.

These still proving inadequate various transports were turned into prison ships. At first these hulks lay in the Hudson and East rivers, but many were eventually anchored in the Wallabout. Amongst them were the Whitby, the Prince of Wales, the Good Hope, the Stromboli, Scorpion, Hunter, Jersey, John, Falmouth, Mentor, Chatham, Kitty, Frederick, Glasgow, Woodlands, Scheldt, and Clyde.

Of all these the old Jersey won the most infamous notoriety. The old "Hell," as she was called, had been originally, a sixty-four gun battleship. Her port holes were securely closed and four small holes, twenty inches square, were cut through for, so-called, ventilation, and protected by iron bars. For a short time during the day the prisoners were allowed to be on deck, but, at sunset, they were driven below and huddled together in the foul, fetid hold till morning. Their incredible sufferings during the hot summer nights, without pure air, cannot be told and hardly imagined. This, coupled with insufficient and poor food, made the death rate enormous. Every morning the brutal cry of the British soldier down the hatchway, "Bring up the dead!" never failed to secure an active and plentiful response. Whilst the lifeless bodies were hastily interred on the adjoining shore, additional living bodies took their places, and so the harvest never failed. It is estimated that the deaths, on the Jersey alone, footed up, at the close of the war, the horrible total of eleven

thousand. When at last she was abandoned the fear of contagion prevented any one from going on board or even approaching her. Her planks were soon filled with worms which ceased not from their work until her decaying hull was riddled with holes, when she sank to the bottom of the bay.

Even though an officer Captain Hiester's prison experience was by no means an enviable one. At first he was confined on the Jersey, but only remained there six days when he was sent, for a short time, on another hulk, and thence transferred to the snow (a three-masted vessel, resembling a barque) Mentor, where were imprisoned his fellow officers of Atlee's Musketry Regiment. The commander of the vessel was Captain Davis. Here they were placed on a short allowance of one half pound pork, and ten ounces of bread per man daily. On September 22d the Mentor was taken up the Narrows and anchored between Governors and Gallows Islands. On September 29th they sailed up the North River and dropped anchor opposite Paulus Hook. On October 7th they were landed in New York, where they signed a parole, and the Pennsylvania officers were lodged in the house of Mr. Mariner, on William street. On the eighth of December he was exchanged for Captain Strong, 26th British Regiment, and departed for his home. During his imprisonment, as a result of the treatment accorded him, he had contracted a slow and wasting fever which so weakened him that, in New York, he was obliged to crawl up the stairs on his hands and knees. He arrived at Reading in an emaciated condition, but, with tender care, pure air and healthy food, he gradually acquired his strength and health.

During his captivity he had been promoted to Major, and, on May 17, 1777, he was commissioned Lieut.

Colonel of the Fourth Battalion, Berks County Militia. In August the First and Second Battalions, under Colonels Hunter and Udree, joined the main army under Washington and participated in the Battle of Brandywine. Undeterred by the recollection of the hardships and sufferings of his past experience Colonel Hiester made every effort to speedily organize his troops, and, in September, the Battalion, with him in command (its elected Colonel, Nicholas Lutz, being still a prisoner on parole) marched to join the Continental Army. It reached them in time for the Battle of Germantown, where, in an advanced skirmish with the enemy, his head was slightly grazed by a bullet. His regiment remained in service until the troops went into camp at Valley Forge, when it was disbanded, although in 1778 he still remained its full Colonel, ready for duty when the call might come.

On April 5, 1779, he was appointed, by the Supreme Executive Council, one of the Commissioners of Exchange, and, on the 21st of October following, one of the committee to seize the personal effects of traitors.

Once more, in 1780, the movements of the British in New York caused great alarm, and, in anticipation of their being directed against Philadelphia itself, 4,000 militia from Pennsylvania were ordered out, to co-operate with Washington and the main army. Of this number the quota for Berks County was 600 men and comprised the Sixth Battalion, under command of Colonel Hiester. Their service lasted from August 10th to September 9th, but was fortunately unattended by active hostilities.

This completed the patriotic, unselfish and valuable military service of Joseph Hiester, which extended through so many years of the war. He then went into partnership with his father-in-law, Adam Witman, in the mercantile

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business, and looked forward to a happy family life and peaceful rest in the thriving town of Reading. This, however, was not so to be. His services were too valuable to be spared, and, accordingly, in 1780, he was chosen to the General Assembly, when his public political life began which was to extend, so honorably, over much of the remainder of his life. In this body he served, almost continuously, until 1790.

In May, 1787, the convention to frame the Federal Constitution assembled in Philadelphia. General Washington was elected president and William Jackson secretary. It sat, with closed doors, until September 18th, at which time its labors were completed and the result laid before the Assembly of Pennsylvania for its ratification, when a motion was made to call a State Convention to deliberate upon its adoption. It met on the 21st of November and organized by the election of Frederick Augustus Muhlenberg as president and James Campbell as secretary. Of this body Joseph Hiester was a member. In accordance with his best judgment, and acting upon the conservative lines which influenced the German element of Berks County especially, he had joined the party to which the majority of his fellow-citizens belonged-the Anti-Federalist, and, later, Republican party, which was succeeded by the Democratic. On the 17th of December following, the final adoption of the draft of the Constitution was carried by a vote of forty-six yeas to twenty-three nays. As an Anti-Federalist Mr. Hiester's vote was cast in the negative, and, therefore, his name does not appear signed to the ratification. There was general rejoicing over this Act. The day after, members of the Convention and Supreme Executive Council, with officers of the state, city of Philadelphia, and others, went in procession from

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the State House to the old Court House where the ratification was solemnly proclaimed. Twelve cannon were fired and the bells were rung. The Convention then returned to the State House to athx their signatures to duplicate copies of the paper. This, however, the conservative opponents to the measure refused to do, although requested to make the Act unanimous. After its adoption by Pennsylvania the new Federal constitution was referred to the other states, and successively approved by each of them.

With the growth of the nation and state the Pennsylvania constitution of 1776 proved inadequate for its effective government, and a revision was demanded. On March 24, 1789, the Assembly recommended the election of delegates to draft a new paper, but the Supreme Executive Council refused to promulgate this action of the Assembly. In September following the latter body passed resolutions for calling a convention; at the election in October delegates were chosen, and, on the fourth Tuesday of November, the convention assembled in Philadelphia, electing Thomas Mifflin as its president. Of this important body Colonel Hiester was also a member, and voted faithfully with the party to which he belonged. Its sessions and deliberations were not concluded until the adoption of the new instrument on September 2, 1790, which was based upon the Constitution of the new Federal Government.

Radical changes were made in the government of the state. The Supreme Executive Council was abolished entirely. The Assembly ceased to have the sole right to make laws, a Senate being added to it. A governor was to be elected to carry out the administration of affairs. The former judicial system was continued, save that the justices of the higher courts held their positions during good behavior instead of for seven years. A Bill of

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Rights re-enacted the old provincial provision, embodied in the first Constitution, respecting freedom of worship, rights of conscience and exemptions from compulsory contributions for the support of any ministry. The recognition of God, and of a future state of rewards and punishments, was still demanded of all holding office, but a belief in the divine inspiration of the Old and New Testaments was not included.


During this convention the right of suffrage came up. Colonel Hiester voted in favor of young men enjoying this privilege who had attained their majority, been residents of the State for two years prior to election, and paid a state or county tax, and was opposed to a resolution granting the right only to such as possessed certain property or enjoyed a specified income. He also voted against a proposition to allow those between twenty-one and twenty-two to cast their suffrage without the payment of any tax. This very proper act on his part was maliciously and ridiculously misconstrued, during his gubernatorial campaign, and used against him, with a certain class of people, to prove his aristocratic tendencies and desire to improperly restrict the right of voting at election.

The number of slaves in Pennsylvania was never excessive, and their treatment materially different from that accorded the like class in the South. In 1790 the total in the state was but 3,737; in 1800 these figures were diminished to 1706; in 1810 there were only 795, and in 1820 but 300, after which they practically disappeared. To bring about this gradual abolition a bill had been enacted by the Assembly, on March 1, 1780, which met with the hearty approval of Mr. Hiester. When, however, in 1788 a supplement to this Act was introduced, which, in his opinion and that of others, was not only unnecessary

but full of imperfections, he signified his disapproval by voting against it. This action was also, later, brought up against him, as a campaign document, to show his lack of desire to emancipate the slaves from their bondage.

Under the new Constitution of the state, creating a Senate, Mr. Hiester was elected to the first body of that branch of the Legislature, and served a full term, from 1700 to 1794, with his usual zeal and fidelity. During this time a system of extensive internal improvements was inaugurated, extending over a term of many years and involving the Commonwealth in heavy debt. As a part of this was the Union Canal, begun in 1792, opening up communication between the Susquehanna and Schuvlkill rivers; also the Conewago canal to open and improve the navigation of the Susquehanna from Wright's Ferry to the mouth of the Swatara, and the incorporation of the Bank of Pennsylvania with its various branches. It was during the year 1793 the dreaded pestilence, yellow fever, ravaged Philadelphia, causing a mortality in that city of about five thousand, equal to twenty-two per cent. of those who remained in it. In 1794 occurred the famous "Whiskey Insurrection," and the Legislature was also much occupied with the defence of settlers in the western part of the state who were threatened by the Indians. The latter were defeated, however, on August 20th, by General Wavne, in a such a decisive battle as to remove all further danger of incursion, and contribute materially to the rapid settlement of that portion of Pennsylvania.

In so much esteem was Colonel Hiester held by his fellow-citizens, because of his long and faithful service to his country and state, that, in 1792, he was chosen a Presidential Elector, at which time he assisted in casting the vote of his great Commonwealth for the equally great




patriot, George Washington, as the Chief Magistrate of the United States of America; and, again, in 1796, when John Adams was elected President and Thomas Jefferson Vice-President, he was honored in the same way.

In 1794 he temporarily laid aside the cares and trials of office, and, for a brief time, was permitted to enjoy the society of his family and to look out for his business affairs. It was but for a brief time, however. In 1796 his first cousin, General Daniel Hiester, who represented Berks County in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Congresses, removed to Maryland, and, in 1797, Joseph Hiester took his place, as an honored member of the Fifth Congress from his native county. Here he served his country with the same unselfish fervor which characterized his former life, for five terms, from 1797 to 1807, in the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Congresses.

Of the details of this service it is impossible to speak in a limited biography, which must confine itself more particularly to his services in his native state and for said state. In all the various events of those years he adhered to the principles of his party, and, whilst possibly not prominent as a brilliant and dashing party leader, yet he was none the less an able and faithful worker. The testimony of one who sat beside him for years in the House of Representatives was that he never failed in his duty and was always at his post.

For the next eight years he was able to devote his time entirely to his business. That he was not only an able statesman and patriotic citizen, but, as well, a successful business man is evidenced by the fact that, at his decease, he left an estate valued at four hundred and sixty-eight thousand dollars, the greater part of which consisted of bonds and stocks. Still, during all this time he kept thor-



oughly posted up on the political events of the day, and in touch with those whose hands shaped them. The writer of this was particularly struck with that fact in glancing over various letters to Mr. Hiester and his son from his grandfather, the Hon. Matthias Richards, who succeeded the Colonel, in 1807, to his seat in Congress which he retained until 1811.

Again, in 1815, Mr. Hiester was sent to the National House of Representatives by his admiring constituents, where he remained, as a member of the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Sixteenth Congresses, until his election as Governor, in October, 1820, when Colonel Daniel Udree took his place for the unexpired term.

During his second service in Congress various important measures came up, prominent amongst which were the Missouri Compromise (March, 1820), which involved an important discussion of the slave question in general; the chartering of the new Bank of the United States (March, 1816); the Seminole War (1817-18); the acquisition of Florida (agreed upon February 22, 1819); and the admission of many states into the Union. These, with similar measures and transactions, engaged the public attention for a long time previous to final action. They were vitally different from those with which the Federalists and Republicans, as such, had to do in the past. As a result, old parties were dying out. Even their names were already changing. The latter was soon to be transformed into the present Democratic, and the former gradually merged into what is now the Republican party. This transformation of parties meant and was caused, of course, by a corresponding change in the opinion of individuals. Amongst those who were influenced by sincere patriotic motives to give up their former allegiance was Mr.

Hiester. Rather should we say that he was not in sympathy with the new views which his party were adopting. That he was not alone in his opinions, is evidenced by the list of distinguished men who, at Carlisle, on March 4, 1817, selected him as the standard bearer of the Independent Republican party, in the coming gubernatorial contest. His opponent was William Findlay, nominated by the Democratic Republicans at Harrisburg on the same day. Though unsuccessful at this time he still received a most flattering vote, especially in his own district. Upon the expiration of his term in Congress so great was his popularity amongst his fellow-citizens, who fully recognized his many sterling qualities, that he was triumphantly reelected, October 18, 1818, to the National body, by the Independent Republicans, over Jonathan Hudson, the nominee of his old party, receiving 1,954 votes to 1,440 cast for his opponent. As the time again drew near for the election of a governor he was once more nominated for that office, although it was with great reluctance he vielded his consent and then only upon the condition that, if successful, he would serve but one term. Mr. Findlay having been renominated by the Democracy, again became his opponent.

For personal vituperation and abuse the campaign then opened has never been equalled in the history of the state. Notwithstanding the deservedly high character of both gentlemen, most disgraceful personal epithets were bandied, shameful accusations made, and ungentlemanly language used. As if the past life and illustrious services of Mr. Hiester were not known to every one he was accused of having voluntarily surrendered to the British on Long Island; of voting, in 1788, to retain the colored people of the state in the bonds of slavery; of opposing, in 1790, the right of suffrage to young men; of aristocratic

tendencies; of ignorance, dotage, and Heaven alone knows what else. Not to be outdone by their adversaries the Federalists retorted in kind.

As a moderate sample of epithets used we have the following resolutions adopted at a Democratic mass meeting held in Kutztown on September 9, 1820:

"Resolved: That we pity the delusion and forgive the weakness of General Hiester in casting himself into the arms of his habitual enemies for the purpose of being raised to a situation for which he never was intended by nature nor qualified by the acquirements of study and experience, and that, upon account of his advanced age and the respectability of his family and connexions, we should be disposed silently to pass over his faults and his follies, his imbecility and his ignorance, was it not that he is aiding and assisting to distract and break down that party to which he owes his frequent elevation to honorable and important stations amongst his fellow-citizens, for which reason we consider it our right and our duty to speak the truth concerning him without fear, favour or affection.

"Resolved: That in our opinion General Hiester is not nor never was possessed of sufficient abilities to enable him to discharge the duties of so important an office as that of Governor of Pennsylvania, in a manner either honorable to himself or beneficial to the state, and we have sufficient reason to apprehend that should he be elected governor we should again be subjected to the pestiferous and disgraceful influence of the infamous John Burns," etc.

On the other side we have the following choice bit, brought out by an article in the *Franklin Republican* stating that Mr. Hiester had given himself up to the British, which was denounced as a "foul and malicious libel":

The Pennsylvania German Society.

"These libels are published for no other reason than because his fellow-citizens are desirous to manifest the sense of his worth and services, in place of the corrupt and dishonest chief magistrate who now disgraces the chair of the state. The act of fabricating such base, groundless and malicious libels proves the desperate wickedness of those who fabricate them. Who but wicked and malicious men would be so malignant as to select the most honorable and patriotic acts of a man's life, and represent them as crimes.

"If Joseph Hiester were where most of his compatriots are, mouldering in the earth, no man would be found base or wicked enough to detract from his revolutionary worth and services. From interested men, from office holders, from Liars and Slanderers, I appeal TO THE PEOPLE, not doubting but they will do justice and reward merit."

The result of such a campaign could never be doubted. Colonel Hiester was completely vindicated by a grand victory. The majority against him, in 1817, was 7,005, whilst the majority in his favor, in 1820, was 1,605. The victory was the more glorious because it was accomplished by a rousing majority for him in his own town and county, both strongly Democratic. Indeed, he was, and still is, the only instance of any one to whom Berks County ever gave a majority of its votes, outside of the regular and sole nominee of the Democratic party. The vote in Reading (with a census of 4,332) stood, for Hiester 1652, for Findlay 525, and, in the county, for Hiester 4,355, for Findlay 2,757.

It was a great victory, not only for Mr. Hiester but still greater for the Federalist, or Independent Republican, party, as he was the first successful gubernatorial candidate whom they had been able to place in the field against their opponents.

An immense ovation was given him at Reading, on November 1st. After a grand procession, speeches by distinguished visiting politicians, and music, followed by a feast, at the head of Penn street, for which two large oxen, a bear and a hog were roasted entire, came toasts, patriotic sentiments, more music and parade, the whole winding up with a glorious torch light procession in the evening.

The inaugural ceremonies were held on Tuesday, December 20, 1820, when Governor Hiester took the oath of office in the presence of the members of the Senate and House of Representatives, and a crowd of spectators. His administration was a most successful one and met with general approval.

The memory of the disgraceful campaign through which he had passed, and the unjust criticisms of himself, as well as Governor Findlay, his opponent, were still fresh in his mind when he penned his inaugural address, and causes him thus to allude to it: "I trust if any errors shall be committed, they will not be chargeable to intention; they will owe their origin to the imperfection of our nature and the narrow limits of human foresight; they will not proceed from a wilful neglect of duty on my part, nor for any want of devotion to the best interests of our beloved country. Such errors, I may justly hope, will meet with indulgence from an enlightened and liberal people."

Besides this he touches on the living questions of the day which occupied the attention of the Assembly during his term of office, and thus gives us, as it were, a succinct skeleton of the after events of his administration.

In it, also, we may get a hint of the causes which led to his change of party, from his opinions expressed on the topics which then engrossed the attention of the two ex-

isting political parties. The copy of his inaugural address, dated December 19, 1820, in the hands of the writer, is printed on white silk and is a memento of the occasion.

After thanking his fellow-citizens for elevating him to that high position, he expresses his determination, with Divine help, to faithfully perform the duties of his office. He reminds them of the many difficulties in his way, asks their hearty co-operation in his labors, and invites sincere and honest criticism of his work. He then goes on as follows:

"Considering myself as elected by the people of this Commonwealth and not by any particular denomination of persons, I shall endeavor to deserve the name of Chief Magistrate of Pennsylvania, and to avoid the disgraceful appellation of Governor of a party. In appointments to office it will be my endeavor to select, without distinction of party, such as I shall believe to be the most honest and capable, and if I shall be successful in this respect, I trust that with the assistance of your wisdom and patriotic endeavors in matters of legislation, the prosperity of the Commonwealth may be promoted, its relations with the general government honorably upheld, and all its lawful rights maintained.

"In deliberating upon the concerns of the Commonwealth, gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives, you will find one of the most prominent topics to be the stagnation of trade and business of every description, the almost total annihilation of confidence between man and man, and the distress of many individuals of the community. If anything could be done to encourage and revive the activity of our citizens; if any means could be devised to restore confidence and to prevent the sacrifice of property, with due attention to the rights of all parties,

I should most heartily concur in any measures calculated to attain these desirable ends. Permit me to suggest to vou whether it would not be possible to devise some method of reducing the enormous power and patronage of the Governor, without impairing the other general features of our present excellent constitution; whether the annual sessions of our Legislature might not be shortened without detriment to the public good; whether a reduction of salaries, of fees of office and compensation for public services, might not at this time take place, to correspond in some degree with the reduced prices of agricultural produce. It also deserves serious consideration whether public improvements might not at this time be advantageously made, and domestic manufactures encouraged with success. Above all it appears an imperative duty to introduce and support a liberal system of education connected with some general religious instruction. These are matters which will certainly engage your attention, and will probably be objects of your deliberations, and if any adequate measures shall be proposed it would give me great pleasure to be instrumental in their promotion."

He ends up by asking all to unite in laboring to promote the common good, and, once more, petitions the Divine blessing to rest upon their work, to the whole of which he attaches his name.

One of the prominent occurrences during Governor Hiester's term was the occupation of the new capitol building, on January 3, 1822. In November, 1799, the Legislature was transferred from Philadelphia to the new State Capitol, Lancaster, where it remained until the summer of 1812 when Harrisburg became the seat of government. The corner-stone of the Capitol was laid by Governor Findlay on May 31, 1819, with imposing ceremonies, but

the erection of the building occupied two years. It was destroyed by fire on February 2, 1897, and has been replaced by the present structure.

The first subject, of importance, which received attention during his administration was that of internal improvement. In February, 1821, a bill was introduced and passed chartering various canal and turnpike companies, and authorizing state subscriptions to the same amounting to some \$50,000, chiefly for the Union Canal already in course of construction.

Other matters given attention were the reduction of salaries of public officers and fees, and the establishment of a new militia system. An Act of especial interest to his native place was that of February 4, 1822, authorizing the erection of a home for the employment and support of the poor in the county of Berks.

So much is said about the common school law of 1834 that we are apt to overlook the facts and acts which led to it. One of these was the introduction of the so-called "Lancasterian System." It was so named after its author. Joseph Lancaster, an Englishman, whose idea was to instruct the largest possible number of children with the smallest possible outlay of means and teaching force, to which end the older scholars were used to teach the younger, thus communicating knowledge to each other. Imperfect as was this method yet it was the progenitor of the later excellent system, and may be justly called the first Public School Law, as that passed prior to it, in 1809, degenerated the whole thing to a mere pauper education. Under this Act the city and county of Philadelphia was erected into the "first school district of Pennsylvania," in 1818, and, through the recommendation and approval of Governor Hiester, the city and county of Lancaster became



"the second school district" during the session of 1822.

Too long have the motives and actions of the Pennsylvania-Germans, regarding our school system, been misconstrued, and too tardy has been the justice which is only now being accorded them. The interest and zeal manifested by Governor Hiester in the advancement of our educational methods have never been conspicuously mentioned in print and seem to be utterly unknown. It may not be so generally remembered that much of the present prosperity of our great University of Pennsylvania is owing to the zealous efforts of the German Lutheran divines of early days and their successors. To the Rev. Drs. Kunze and Helmuth belongs the credit for the establishment of the "German Department" which accomplished such excellent results in its day, and from which, in 1787, was derived Franklin College, at Lancaster, in whose interest the best German elements were, for a time, united, and amongst whose patrons were Benjamin Franklin and Benjamin Rush. The chief honor for the establishment of that institution belongs to the Reverends Helmuth, Hendel, Weyberg and H. E. Muhlenberg, who was its first president, all Pennsylvania-German Lutheran clergymen. Joseph Hiester was one of its original trustees, and amongst the signatures to the peculiar address issued to the Germans of Pennsylvania after the charter had been granted by the state, was that of Daniel Hiester. We have just seen how his efforts did not stop there but widened out so as to include the entire public.

Governors Wolf and Ritner may well be held up as shining examples of what Pennsylvania-German governors have accomplished in the cause of public school education, but before them, and on as high a pedestal beside them, towers the figure of Joseph Hiester, through whose veins coursed the same blood.



After most ably and faithfully performing the manifold duties of his office, and firmly refusing to permit his name to be again used as a candidate for the position, although repeatedly solicited to do so by his admiring and appreciative fellow-citizens, he retired into private life on December 16, 1823.

In his last annual message he expresses many sentiments showing his strong love for the state and zeal for her welfare and progress, concluding as follows:

"Having been for nearly fifty years occasionally engaged in various highly responsible situations in the service of my country, and having witnessed its progress from colonial vassalage to independence and sovereignty, it is with most sincere pleasure that, on quitting the theatre of action, I can congratulate you and our fellow citizens at large on the propitious situation in which it is now placed; and I avail myself of the occasion it affords me of repeating my fervent prayers to the Almighty Ruler of the Universe, under whose superintending influence it has attained its present eminence, that he may continue to cherish it with his fostering care, preserving its citizens in the free enjoyment of their just rights and republican institutions, until all earthly governments shall be terminated by the consummation of time."

Joseph Hiester was held in esteem by all who knew him; a sincere friend; a loving parent and faithful husband; a true Christian; an unostentatious but most able official, sound to the core in the conscientious discharge of all his duties; a capable and successful business man, and true patriot. If this biography has failed to bring out these facts it has failed in its purpose.

He was of commanding presence, about six feet tall and

weighing some two hundred pounds. His manners were always most pleasant and unassuming, attracting every one to him and causing those who survived him to affectionately recall their memory of him. He frequently visited his farms. Mr. John Sailor, who had charge of that on the Kutztown road, at "Hiester's Lane" (now in North Reading) delighted, in after years, to relate the successful manner in which he threshed out grain with a flail, during a visit in 1825.

Upon the expiration of his term of office he lived, in retirement, in Reading, on the northern side of Penn street, between Fourth and Fifth streets (on the western half of lot No. 30 in town plan, now No. 437 Penn street). The building was a two-story brick dwelling, having a large frame stable on the rear of the lot. He owned a number of farms in Alsace (now Muhlenberg), Cumru and Bern Townships, and also tracts of woodland on Mt. Penn, the whole numbering nearly two thousand acres, also seven prominent business stands and dwellings in Reading, with various out lots.

His wife, Elizabeth (née Witman), who was born April 2, 1750, died June 11, 1825. He survived her for seven years, dying June 10, 1832, in the home which he had occupied for two-score years. In accordance with his wishes there was no military or other ostentatious display, but, nevertheless, a very large concourse of mourning friends followed his body, on the 13th of June, to its resting place in the graveyard of the First German Reformed church of Reading, Pa., at Sixth and Washington streets, of which congregation he was a consistent member and trustee. Some years later, probably in 1870 when most of the bodies were reinterred, the remains of the Governor and his wife were removed to the Charles Evans cemetery, of the same city.



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GENEALOGY OF THE HIESTER FAMILY.



a Sun, or. Crest: Between two horns, surmounting a helmet offronté, a sun as in the Arms.

The origin of the Hiester family was the Silesian Knight Premiscloros Hüsterniz, who flourished about 1329 and held the office of Mayor, or Town Captain, of the city of Swineford.

A. D. 1480 the Patrician and Counsellor of Swineford. Adolphus Louis, called "der Hiester," obtained from the Emperor Frederick letters patent, whereby he and his posterity were authorized to use the coat-of-arms he had inherited from his ancestors, to whom it was formerly granted, with the faculty of transmitting the same, as an hereditary right and privilege, to all his descendants.

Dr. Lawrence Hiester, b. Frankfort-on-the-Main, September 19, 1683, d. Helmstedt, April 18, 1758, Professor of Surgery at Helmstedt from 1720, and the founder of



modern German surgery, was a member of this family, also, doubtless, General von Hiester commanding the Hessian contingent in the British army during the Revolutionary war.

The American branches spring from three brothers, John, Joseph and Daniel, who were the sons of Johannes Hiester and wife Catharine. Their native place was the town of Elsoff, in the Grafschaft, County of Wittgenstein, province of Westphalia, Germany. The first of the brothers to reach America was John, the eldest, in 1732, who settled at Goshenhoppen, then in Philadelphia, now Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. He was followed by Joseph and Daniel, on the ship St. Andrew from Rotterdam, who took the oath of allegiance at Philadelphia on September 26, 1737, and immediately joined their brother. Here Daniel purchased a farm, already somewhat improved. Having thoroughly acquainted themselves with the nature of the country the brothers united in purchasing a tract of land from the Proprietary Government, between two and three thousand acres in size, in Bern Township of the present Berks County, Penna., extending from the old stone Bern church to the Tulpehocken creek. On this property the two elder brothers located whilst Daniel remained temporarily at Goshenhoppen until 1774 when he, also, removed to Berks County and took up his residence in the town of Reading.

Their graves stand together in the graveyard of the old stone Bern Church of Berks County, with one stone for the two.

As previously stated, he remained in Montgomery County until 1774 when he removed to Reading. He was a member of the Reformed Church of old Goshenhoppen, his name appearing on the original roll of male members entered in 1746 by Pastor George Michael Weiss on the church register.

He lived on a property in Upper Salford Township, immediately below the present village of Sumneytown, named after Isaac Sumony, who owned much property in that locality. He became a foremost man in the neighborhood. In 1757 he built a fine, two-story brick mansion on the east side of the turnpike, close to Ridge Valley Creek. It was sufficiently prominent to be noted on the map of Pennsylvania published by Nicholas Scull, the Province Surveyor, in 1759. It was a notable building in its day, and is still standing. A broad hall runs through the middle of the first story, on each side of which are spacious parlors; the second story is divided into bed rooms; above this is the roomy garret of the olden time.



Heavy eaves run along the gable roof, and a corresponding cornice forms the lower part of the gable. It was originally provided with a secret closet in which to hide plate during troublous times.

In 1777 he was appointed a Justice of the Peace for Berks County, where he was then living.
